SPEECH AND HEARING RESTORED.

PITTSBURG, July 21.—After being deaf and dumb for almost fifty-nine years, T. W. Tieman, an upholsterer of Everett and Omega streets, is now able to hear and talk and the manner of the recovery of speech and hearing is the most remarkable of his remarkable experience.

Mr. Tieman is sixty-nine years old and when he was ten years of age he was stricken with a severe attack of smallpox. After his recovery his hearing became very bad and finally he was completely deaf.

As soon as his speech and hearing left him he learned the deaf and dumb alphabet and for fifty-nine years he carried on all conversation in that silent language.

During Monday afternoon he was engaged in putting some shingles on the roof of his house, and while standing on a ladder he lost his balance and fell to the ground, a distance of twenty feet.

Dr. White had known Tieman and knew that he was deaf and dumb and he was utterly astonished when suddenly the injured man raised up and said:

"Say, doctor, where are you taking me?" For a minute or two the doctor was too astonished to answer and stared at the man in surprise.

"All right," said the heretofore deaf and dumb man. "I guess that is the best place for me."

This answer still more astonished the doctor, who realized that the injured man had heard and had therefore recovered both speech and hearing.

On arrival at the hospital Tieman was taken to the ward and there he again talked with the doctors and nurses, and the longer he was in the hospital the better able he was to hear and talk, and it is the opinion of the attending physicians that his recovery is permanent.

MAY COST HIS LIFE.

GAVE SEAT TO GIRL, STOOD ON "RUNNING BOARD" AND WAS BRUSHED OFF BY PASSING CAR.

NEW HAVEN, July 24.—His politeness will probably cost the life of this young man, who lies in the New Haven Hospital unconscious and at death's door. He gave his place in a crowded open trolley car to a young woman and stood on the "running board," or car step, next to the track on which cars were passing in the opposite direction.

One of these cars struck him and swept him from the step. His skull was fractured and he was otherwise frightfully injured.

The car on which this young man was a passenger was going from Savin Rock to this city last midnight. The youth is about twenty years old. His identity is not known. He was well dressed.

The car was crowded with people returning from the shore. When the car stopped to take on another passenger, a girl, the young man raised his hat and said, "Take this seat, please," and made room by stepping upon the "running board" which was not protected by a guard rail.

At his side sat Richard Bifield, whose head was disfigured by a livid, deep scar. Bifield took off his hat, and pointing to the scar, said:

"See that? You're a lobster if you ride there. I gave up my place to a girl a few weeks ago and a car coming the other way knocked me from the step and came near killing me. I'm not going to give up my seat again to anybody."

"Oh, well, you know a chap has to be polite," laughed the young man, glancing at the girl, who rewarded him with a smile.

Those were the last words he uttered. A car whizzing along on the other track struck him and hurled him with frightful force to the roadway. He fell under the car wheels and was dreadfully mutilated.

Several women in the cars fainted, others became hysterical. The trolley company sent these home in carriages. Other passengers refused to ride further on the cars that were in the accident and other cars were hurried to the place.

Many of the passengers have offered to testify to the absence of a guard rail which would have prevented the polite young man from standing where he did.
