SPEECH AND HEARING RESTORED.

PITTSBURG, July 21.-After being deaf and dumb for almost fifty-nine years, T. W. Tieman, an upholsterer of Everett and Omega streets, is now able to hear and talk and the manner of the recovery of speech and hearing is the most remarkable of his remarkable experience.

Mr. Tieman is sixty nine years old and when he was ten years of age he was stricken with a severe attack of smallpox. After his recovery his hearing became very bad and finally he was completely deaf. Soon after that his speech began to falter and within a few weeks he was unable to talk or hear. He was thus afflicted until Monday.

As soon as his speech and hearing left bim he learned the deaf and dumb alphabet and for fifty-nine years he carried on

all conversation in that silent language. During Monday afternoon he was engaged in putting some shingles on the roof of his house, and while standing on a ladder he lost his balance and fell to the ground, a distance of twenty feet. After his injuries were attended to it was deemed advisable to remove him to the Homeopathic Hospital and the ambulance was sent for. Dr. John F. White, of the hospital staff, accompanied the driver of the ambulance. When the house was reached the injured man, who was still unconscious, was placed in the ambulance and
