**POLITICAL MEETINGS.**—Mr. J. D. Phinney addressed meetings at Mill Creek and West Galloway last Friday and Saturday night in the interest of Hon. O. J. LeBlanc. Both meetings were well attended and the speakers were listened to with the greatest interest, being interrupted at different times by applause. Mr. James Barnes, M. P. P., and John Jardine spoke at Mill Creek and Mr. Jardine at West Galloway. It was evident from the reception given the speakers that the gov't. candidate would take a large vote in both these parishes.

**SUDDEN DEATH AT BROWN'S YARD.**—A very sudden death occurred at Brown's Yard, Kent Co., on Tuesday when John Flanagan, aged 70 years, dropped dead in the woods. He had gone to the woods a short distance from his house to cut some wood, and after cutting the wood and loading it on his wagon started for home, but only had gone a few steps when he fell dead. He was found in the woods by his son who with the assistance of Mr. William McKinnon, of this town, took him to his home. Much sympathy is felt for his sorrowing wife and family. Mr. Flanagan intended leaving with his family in a day or two for Oak Bay.

**DEATH AT JARDINEVILLE.**—The death occurred at Jardineville, Kent Co., on 17th, inst., of Mrs. Wm. Waller, in the 80th year of her age. Deceased, whose maiden name was Mary Kie, was born in Creetown (The Ferry Town O' Cree), Kircudbrightshire, Scotland, and came to this country in 1833. She has lived in Jardineville the greater part of her life and was always in the best of health. Her death was due to old age. She leaves a husband, two sons and two daughters. The sons are John and David, who reside in Brooklyn, N. J., and the daughters are Mrs. Chas. Ward, of Trout Brook, Kent Co., and Mary Ann, who lives in Jardineville with her parents. The funeral which took place on Saturday, was quite largely attended. The interment was made in the Presbyterian churchyard at Kingston. Rev. D. Fraser officiated.

**DEATH OF MRS. MILLER.**—The very sudden death of Janet E. Miller, of the late John Miller, which occurred at her home on Queen St. last Friday morning, was quite a shock to the people of Richibucto and vicinity. Deceased lady, who had been in her usual good health up to Wednesday night, took very suddenly ill and on Friday morning succumbed to that fatal disease, paralysis of the brain. She was in the 84th year of her age and was a good Christian lady and a member of the Presbyterian church. She was a native of Annan, Scotland and came to this country when quite young. She leaves surviving three sons and one daughter, who have the sympathy of the whole community. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon and was very largely attended, upwards of 30 horses following the remains to the Presbyterian church yard at Kingston, where her remains were interred. Rev. D. Fraser officiated. The pallbearers were Messrs. John P. Bell, Wm. White, Martin Flanagan, E. Pine, John Irving, W. D. Carter.

### IN THE TRANSVAAL.

PRETORIA, Oct. 25.—The Transvaal was today proclaimed a part of the British empire, the proclamation being attended with impressive ceremonies. The Royal Standard was hoisted in the main square of the city, the Grenadiers presented arms, massed bands played the national anthem, Sir Alfred Milner read the proclamation and 6,200 troops, representing Great Britain and her colonies, marched past.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 26.—Hans Botha has cut off a train with a reconnoitering party of the Highland Brigade between Holders and Greyling staff in the Transvaal colony, tearing up the rails in front and behind the train. In the fight which followed, two captains and eight men were wounded and all were captured.

It is reported that former President Steyn and the members of the executive council are at Fouriesburg south of Bethlehem, and that he had declared Fouriesburg to be the 'capital of the Orange Free State.'

Mr. Steyn has ordered Krieter, a member of the late volkeraad, to be tried on the charge of high treason.

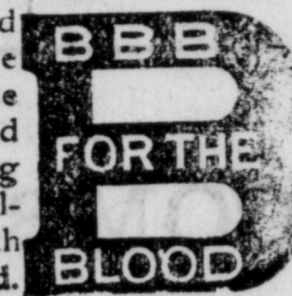
LONDON, Oct. 26.—It is regarded here as a curious coincidence that the news of the recapture of Jacobsdale by the Boers should be received concurrently with the expected arrival home from South Africa of the City Imperial Volunteers as Jacobsdale was the scene of the latter's first fight. The town was captured by these volunteers February 15.

The Nova Scotia Steel company recently purchased the areas of manganese deposits in the Magdalen Islands held by W. G. Tait, Pictov. The price paid was \$300,000.
