PRETORIA, Oct. 25.—The Transvaal was to-day proclaimed a part of the British empire, the proclamation being attended with impressive ceremonies. The Royal Standard was hoisted in the main square of the city, the Grenadiers presented arms, massed bands played the national anthem, Sir Alfred Milner read the proclamation and 6,200 troops, representing Great Brit. ain and her colonies, marched past. -The entertainment given by Miss E. Pauline Johnston in the Temperance hall on Tuesday evening was quite largely attended, and was greatly enjoyed by those present.


-On account of lack of space in publishing the nomination speeches, we are forced to leave the prize list of the Kent Co. Agricultural exhibition over until next issue.
