Many have come with a very incomplete idea of the immensity of the Exposition, a few evidently thinking it some exaggerated State Fair at the best. None has been more imbued with the notion than Buffalo was foisting a twenty-five cent show on an unsuspecting public with a fifty cent charge for admission than our neighbors foreman on the Levis end of the road. from Canada.

METHOD IN USE.

When George D. Cameron, commision er for the Pan-American to the Dominion brings his Canadian friends here, his method of properly impressing them is to take them first to the Ellicott Square, and through a few of the fifty or more Pan-Americau offices there, and then direct to the grounds. This simple method has never failed to remove any thought the visitor might have had that Buffalo's Exposition is in the second class.

This morning James C. Duffield, the president of the City Gas Company of London, Ontario, came to Buffalo with Commissioner Cameron and made his tour of investigation of the Pan-American. After a few hours on the grounds and some talk with a few of the officials in Ellicott Square, he did not hesitate to explain his delight and admiration.

"It's the bigest surprise I ever had," he said to The Enquirer. "Why, I'd supposed, as most of the people in Canada suppose, that you were to have a show something on a par with the Toronto Exposition. I was entirely unprepared for the immensity of this thing. We've heard something of the Pan-American, to be sure, but thought it was some Yankee scheme to corral Canadian money with the plea of being a show for all the Am-

TALK IN PROVINCE.

"To show you how the thing has been received in Canada, I can tell you of the talk that has been made throughout the province, of starting a counter attraction in the shape of an exposition in Toronto. For this exposition it was proposed to do nate \$100,000, a pretty big splurge, we thought. But goodness, here you're putting in \$10,000,000.

"I tell you, the Canadians don't appreciate in the slightest what you are going to have down here. Canadian manufacturers and others who could exhibit, particularly. I'm sure that about 90 per cent. of the people of Ontario will come to Buffalo next year. They can't help it when they realize, and they surely will, what a big show you've got. It will be the opportunity of a lifetime for anyone within several hundred miles of here. From 50 to 60 per cent. of the people of Quebec will come.

"If Canadian manufacturers could only see what I've seen to-day, there would be a rush for space that you would not be able to cope with.

"By exhibiting in Buffalo, the Canadian manufacturer will reach his own public as quick as he possibly could in his own country, and with the added advantage of all the superlative attractions of the Pan-American, for most of the people of Quebec and Ontario and a large percent age from the other provinces are sure to



A RECORD OF SCANDAL.

CONSERVATIVE REGIME. (Montreal Herald)

The politicians who managed the affairs of Canada for so long, particularly Sir Charles Tupper, are asking for the confidence of the electors. We are, therefore, compelled to look at the record they spread upon the pages of Canadian history. Summarized it includes the following:

Charges of dishonesty, nepotism and fraud against Alexander Mackenzie, who is now acknowledged by these same men to have been a model of integrity and patriotism.

An auti-British policy of protection, which taxed British goods higher than goods from the United Staces, and which they said, if it hurt British connection, 'He jilted a girl who has two brothers then "so much the worse for British con

> A policy that drove Canadians out of the country and let all our immigrants slip through our fingers so that the census of 1891 showed a depleted population, and compelled a reduction in the parliament ary representation.

> Unparalleled corruption, costing Canada many millions of dollars, and compelling one Conservative after the other to retire from public life, either by way of resignation, or the gaol.

> About \$1,500,000 were stolen from the public chest out of the total expenditure of \$1,800,000 on the St. Charles branch of the Intercolonial Railway, only 14 miles long. Sir Charles Tupper communicated with the contributors to cam paign funds at Quebec through his nephew Mr. Charles Tupper Hillson, who was

> Between 1878 and 1891, during nearly the whole of which time Sir Charles Tupper was a member of the cabinet, one firm which they did \$2,000,000 worth of work, man who had a "pull" on a colleague of Sir Charles Tupper's received \$187,000. A cabinet minister received at least \$10, 000 for favors granted.

A parliamentary supporter and confi dential political agent of the cabinet of which Sir Charles Tupper was a member received \$130,000. He owned up to receiving \$60,000, but an examination of the books showed the larger sum, which it was said, was paid out to "carry the constituencies."

By letting a contract for dredging a an exorbitant rate the Conservative gov ernment received back from the benefi ciaries \$25,000 for the general election.

The firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co paid the agent of the cabinet \$22,000 for a certain graving dock contract, the profiton which were \$125,000.

For securing a cross-wall contract a Quebec for the political contractors the treasurer of the Conservative party in that district received \$25,000.

For the building of the Esquimalt dock \$207,168 was paid, over and above the amount of the tender. The contractors made \$241,000 profits, not including \$27,-000 paid out in bribery and corruption and entered in the books as "donations."

An official list of expenditures in one general election campaign, 1887, showed that the sum of \$112,700 was raised out of public contracts and spent in the constituencies on the orders of two cabinet ministers and the treasurer of the party

A cabinet minister stated under oath that he secured \$25,000 in bank bills from a railway president whose company was in receipt of subsidies from the Conservative government. He disbursed it in bribing the electors, and did not put at y of it in his own pocket. He acted as agent of the party which is now marshalled under Sir Charles Tupper, and the culprit was shielded by Sir Mackenzie Bowell and his colleagues.

A public loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars was caused by the Curran bridge scandal or the Curran bridge steal in 1893.

Public situations were sold in Northamberland county, Ont., by the Conser vative member of his election committee.

A sum of \$300,000 was spent in con structing a lock which was officially estimated to cost \$44,000, and which has never been used except by one boat. The contractor was a prominent party man, and immediately afterwards carried a seat for the government in the general

A work on the St. Lawrence canals estimated to cost \$300,000 cost \$900,000, and even then the minister of railways and canals, Mr. Haggart, stated in the House of Commons, in 1894, that the work was not used for the purpose intended, viz., navigation.

Frauds were discovered and exposed by investigation in the department in regard to immigration.

Frauds were detected in the inside department of railways and canals, and the secretary of the department they were forced to dismiss
