



PASSPORT.

Mr. Kintora Ike registered at Nugata, aged 38 years 4 months.

VIOLATORS OF OUR NATURALIZATION LAWS IN THE TOILS.

(Vancouver World, Sept. 12.) The Provincial Government will investigate the cases of alleged fraudulent naturalization of Japanese. Already one Oriental culprit has been arrested, and two others will be similarly treated as soon as they are apprehended.

In its news columns and editorially, The World has repeatedly demanded that the Government take this action, and establish beyond peradventure of doubt, whether or not the allegations were true of wholesale frauds in connection with the conversion of Japanese into British sub-

ed. The average Jap is as wily as any man, and after several slight misadventures, the situation finally resolved itself into a matter of waiting for one week after the game had been frightened away before the men could be seized.

While the case was being worked up, sufficient evidence was secured to warrant the statement that hundreds of Japanese had been transformed into Britishers immediately after their arrival in British Columbia, and that in many cases a Japanese interpreter and a Vancouver notary public had been mixed up in the affair, whether innocently or knowingly, has not yet been demonstrated.

The following papers bearing on the case of Kintora Ike tells the story of all the culprits against whom definite charges have so far been preferred. Their passports conclusively demonstrate that they have been in Canada but five months, while the law requires a residence of four years. The information is as follows:

That at Vancouver, B. C., in the County of Vaucouver, on the 5th day of June, 1900, Kintora Ike did then and there upon his oath before W. J. Thicke, a notary public, duly qualified residing and practicing at the city of Vancouver aforesaid, falsely, wilfully and completely depose and swear in substance and to the effect following: "That in the period of four

years preceding the said 5th of June he did reside in the Dominion of Canada with intent to settle therein, without being during those four years a stated resident of any foreign country," whereas in truth the said Kintora Ike did not reside in the Dominion of Canada during said period of four years and the said Kintora Ike did thereby commit wilful and corrupt perjury.

But there was nothing very difficult about that for Ike who stepped to the front and fulfilled the requirements of the statute as follows:

NATURALIZATION ACT, CANADA. Oath of Residence.

I, Kintora, Ike, late of Japan, now in Vancouver, B. C., fisherman, do swear that, in the period of four years preceding this date, I have resided four years in the Dominion of Canada with intent to settle therein, without having been during such four years a stated resident in any foreign country. So help me God. KINTORA IKE.

other of the approach of possible danger. Officer Campbell persisted in searching for. the suspect when almost everyone else indays of very arduous work, his efforts were rewarded. Captain Tatlow was the first to take the matter up on behalf of the Provincial Government, and worked for several days laying plans for the apprehension of suspects under the advice of W. J.
