To this the German Government adds that such punishment must precede, as an essential preliminary, all other negotiations between it and the Chinese Government. These two declarations, coming simultaneously, though independently, set at rest many rumors which have been extant to the effect that Great Britain has no definite policy in China and that German policy is a mere echo of that of Russia. The British policy is soon to be amply definite and positive, and the German to be radically different from, if not diametrically opposed to, the Russian. The policy to be followed by the United States has not yet been announced but there is good reason to believe that it will be in the nature of an agreement, at least partially, with Germany. In other words, the United States, while not insisting on the surrender of the criminals as a condition precedent to negotiations, will insist on their punishment as one of the conditions of peace. It goes without saying that President McKinley agrees fully with Lord Salisbury's demand for the return of the Emperor Kwang Su and the retirement from power of the Empress Dowager. Thus, it seems that the outrages will certainly meet a fitting punishment and that Russia will not be able to save the "face" of China in return for a quid pro quo to be paid at some later date—after the trans-Siberian railroad has been finished.

According to a recent bulletin of the Treasury Bureau of Statistics, the Canadian preferential tariff of 25 per cent in favor of the United Kingdom, has not had the expected effect of reducing the proportion which the United States supplies of manufactures imported into Canadian territory, the imports of dutiable articles into that country from the United States in the fiscal year 1899 aggregating over \$44,000,000 and from Great Britain less than \$28,000,000, while that the United States furnishes a much larger amount of manufactures of iron and steel than the United Kingdom. The Canadian tariff, it will be remembered, was in 1897 so adjusted that the duty on articles entering Canada from the United Kingdom was made, beginning with April 1897, 12 1/2 per cent less than the rate from other parts of the world, and on July 1st, 1898 another reduction in favor of the United Kingdom was made, bringing the total reduction to 25 per cent as against goods coming from other parts of the world. A recent announcement indicates that, beginning with July 1st, 1900, a still further reduction would be made, so that the rates of duty on articles from the United Kingdom would be 33 1/2 per cent less than those from other parts of the world. While the effect of the third reduction, which went into operation July 1st, 1900, cannot yet be determined it is practicable to compare the imports of manufactures into Canada from the United Kingdom and the United States respectively during the years ending June 30th, 1898, 1899 and 1900, and thus determine whether the advantages which the manufacturers of the United Kingdom have had over those of the United States during that time, have had a perceptible effect upon the relative growth of the imports of Canada from the two countries, the United Kingdom and the United States. The bulletin gives tables showing the imports into Canada of 20 principal manufactures from the United Kingdom in the years ending June 30th, 1898, 1899 and 1900 and the imports of a like number of manufactured articles from the United States during the same term. In these articles, which may properly be termed representative manufactures, the increase in importations from the United Kingdom in the fiscal year 1900 compared

with 1898, was 32 per cent, while the increase from the United States for the same period was 37 per cent. The advantage is not all together on the side of the United States, however, for the bulletin calls attention to the fact that the total exports to British North America from the United States in the fiscal year 1900 exceeded those of any previous year in our history, being \$97,041,722, against \$89,570,458 in 1899, and \$84,889,819 in 1898.

THE SUSSEX FAIR

WILL BE OPENED ON THE FIRST OF OCTOBER—GOOD ATTRACTIONS.

There Will be a Complete Agricultural and Industrial Displays and Two Days Racing on the East Sussex Track—A Thousand Dollars Hung Up.

Sussex, Sept. 22, (Special).—The Sussex exhibition will open October 1 and continue five days. Preparations are well advanced for a good fair, and plans are maturing to make various departments excel former years. There is a very fine agricultural exhibit in sight and it is looked to excel even that at St. John because Sussex is the centre of a fine farming district and the fair being later than St. John's, the crops will have had more time to mature.

The merchants of Sussex are taking much interest in the exhibition and will assist in making success by exhibits. Some St. John firms will also exhibit. The management has arranged for attractions additional to the live stock, agricultural and industrial departments and chief of these will be horse races. There will be two days' of racing—Tuesday and Wednesday, 2nd and 3rd prox. The races will be on the new track which is within a minute's walk of the fair grounds. There will be \$1,000 hung up in purses for the following events:

Tuesday—2 25 class, 2.35 class and 3 minute class.

Wednesday—Free-for-all, and 2 29 class.

The Sussex track is conceded by horsemen to be very fast and fine contests are looked for as the best of the three provinces and Calais stables will be in the events.

Contracts were closed with H. Percy Hill, of Toronto, who supplied the attractions at the St. John exhibition, to secure for the Sussex show three performers—Miss Bessie Gilbert, lady cornetist, who made such a successful appearance at St. John a few years ago; Frank LaMondae, who does a comedy high wire performance which he calls "Fun on a clothes line;" and Auguste Duell, who was here last year and had all in wonderment at his trapeze work. These performers will appear in the fair building and will be seen without extra charge.

Very low railway rates have been secured for all points between Newcastle, Point du Chene, Amherst and St. John. There is being arranged with the I. C. R. the running of a fast special train from St. John to Sussex on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings of the exhibitions. The train will leave St. John about 10.30 and there will be opportunity to see the fair, attend the races, and return to St. John in the early evening or later if desirable. The C. P. R. will run excursions from St. Stephen, St. Andrews, Woodstock and Fredericton.
