(From our regular correspondent.) WASHINGTON, D. C., U. S. A., Sept. 21 1900 -The brief flurry in administration circos caused by the political necessity for exac United States to accept Russia's proposal for peace in China and withdrawal from Pekin, has passed away and the United States has apparently gotten back to its old moorings alongside of Great Britain.
