DEATH OF ALEX. LEGGATT.—The death occurred last Thursday evening of one of Richibucto's oldest and most respected citizens, when Alexander Leggatt succumbed to that fatal disease, cancer of the stomach. Deceased, who had formerly been in the employ of the late Henry O'Leary for a large number of years, and lately with R. O'Leary, was scarcely a day sick until about four months ago when he had to stop work and take to his bed. He was highly respected by all who knew him and was of a kindly disposition. He was 66 years of age and leaves a wife and family of five children, three daughters and two sons, to mourn their sad loss. The funeral took place at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon under the auspices of Richibucto Division, No. 42, S. of T., he being a charter member of that order. Upwards of 40 members were in attendance and marched in front of the hearse. It was one of the largest funerals seen here for some time. The remains were interred in the Church of England cemetery. Rev. D. Fraser and Rev. H. A. Meek, as chaplain of the Division, officiated. The pall bearers were, Messrs. J. D. McMinn, John P. Bell, Wm. White, James A. Jardine, Frederick Ferguson and Benedict Haines.

LABOR DAY.—Labor Day was celebrated in Richibucto by a game of base ball between the Royal Oaks of Chatham, and the Crescents of this town. Although the weather was exceedingly hot a large number of people were on the field to witness the game, which was, as far as the sixth inning, one of the most exciting games seen here this season. At 2 o'clock the visiting team went to the bat, and the home team took the field. In this inning the Royal Oaks, who had Lynch and McEwen as their battery, were whitewashed, and the Crescents got 4 runs. The Royal Oaks thinking the home team was getting the better of them, put Ramsay, a left handed pitcher into the box, and from that until the 8th inning the Crescents did not make a score. The visiting team did not get a score until the third inning, when they secured 3 runs. They increased their score in the 5th inning, by taking in 2 runs, and also 9 in the 6th, 1 in the 7th, 4 in the 8th and 4 in the 9th, making a total score of 23. HON. H. R. EMMERSON RESIGNS AS PREMIER OF THE PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 1.—Hon. H. R. Emerson, premier of New Brunswick, resigned last night and has addressed the following to the electors of the province of New Brunswick: "To the electors of the Province of New Brunswick: "Gentlemen,—I feel it my duty upon handing to His Honor the Lieut. Governor my resignation as premier and attorney-general of the province, to express to you my high appreciation of the confidence which you have reposed in me during my tenure of office, as evidenced by the very handsome support you have accorded to the government which I had the honor to lead, when appealed to at the polls. I trust you will believe me when I assure you that in relinquishing my position in the provincial government I have not been wholly actuated by personal considerations, but that whatever may be my future I shall always cherish a grateful remembrance of your generous confidence and support, and will ever take a deep interest in the prosperity of my native province, in whose great future I have such an abiding faith.

"With renewed expressions of my gratitude and esteem, believe me to be Sincerely, your obedient servant, (Signed) H. R. EMMERSON."

His Honor Lieut. Governor McClellan called upon Hon. Mr. Tweedie to form a new government, which he was able to do promptly, the following being the personnel:

- Hon. L. J. Tweedie, premier and provincial secretary.
 - Hon. William Pugsley, attorney general.
 - Hon. A. T. Dunn, surveyor general.
 - Hon. C. H. LaBillois, chief commissioner of public works.
 - Hon. L. P. Farris, commissioner for agriculture.
 - Hon. H. A. McKeown and Hon. G. F. Hill, without portfolio.

The government will finish its session to-night and the members will likely disperse to their homes to-morrow to spend Sunday, and will probably return in the near future to arrange the dates for holding the elections necessary. —Quite a smashup occurred on Queen St. on Sunday afternoon. —A Harcourt correspondent writing to The Chatham World on the 28th instant, says: Miss May Chrystal, youngest daughter of Mr. James Chrystal, section foreman on the Intercolonial Railways is very ill of typhoid fever. Dr. McCulley of Moncton was here last night in consultation with the local M. D. and considers Miss Chrystal's chances of recovery not of the best.

—The yield of the wheat harvest in the Middle West this year is extraordinary. How the wheat is cultivated and how it is harvested are the subjects of an extremely readable article in the September Magazine Number of The Outlook, called "The West's Golden Harvest." The author is a Western writer of some note, Mr. Charles M. Harger, and his paper is accompanied by many reprints of photographs of harvest scenes and methods. (\$3 a year. —The recent improvements made on the Court House and jail, have added greatly to the appearance of the building. The outside has been painted a light color with dark stone colored trimmings. The inside of the Court room and hall has been painted and a new floor laid down stairs. New windows have been put in and other repairs done. The Committee, Councillors Peters, Richard and Atkinson deserve credit for the thorough manner in which the work has been done. Mr. E. Pine had charge of the work. Other repairs are needed which will be done next year.

—Miss Neta deOloqui, of Kingston, arrived in Havana, Cuba, Aug. 2, where she has taken up her residence and accepted a position under the U. S. Govt. as Inspector of hospitals and charities for a certain portion of the Island. She speaks of the climate being delightful, far from uncomfortable hot, no excessive temperature nor yellow fever. The voyage from New York was quiet and uneventful. Speaking of the condition of affairs there, she says: The Cubans are anxiously awaiting the time for taking control of their own affairs and their relations with Americans are not over cordial, nor with the Spaniards, but the latter and the present rulers are on the best of terms.
