A NAPOLEON OF FINANCE.

A CRACK YANKEE MAKES \$4,000 A YEAR AT A COST OF \$3.50.

Here is an interesting story of a Portland financier told in the Boston Journal: There is a man in Portland, Me., who is about as near a typical Yankee for ingenuity and financial skill as can be found, for he built a brick block of four stories on a leased lot of land which is bringing him in about \$4,000 a year in rentals, and all it cost him was \$3.50. Now, that is a poser, no doubt, but this is the way he did it: He saw a well-located lot which was marred by some ill-appearing buildings, but it was owned by a woman in Massachusetts, not a hundred miles from Boston. So he invests \$2 in a ticket to Boston and back, tells the owner of the lot if she will lease it to him for 20 years he would pay her \$540 a year and at the end of the period the block would be hers. She agreed to the proposition and leased him the land. Back he went to Portland, cleared off the lot for the stuff on it, and then found he could not raise the necessary \$12,000 to put up the building. So he writes to his landlady and proposes that she lend him the \$12,000 and he would pay her 6 per cent. interest. She agreed. He built the block, but at an excess of \$4,000. Then he invites his landlady to come to Portland and see the results. She came and saw the block and then saw him. "But you did not build that block for \$12,000," said she. "No," he replied, "there is still \$4,000 owing on it. Do you want to take that increased investment? You see what a fine block it is." Yes, she was willing to, he obliging himself to pay her \$600 a year rent and 6 per cent. interest on the \$16,000. A lawyer made out the necessary legal documents on the bargain, and charged \$1.50 for his services. Sum total of the cost to the cute Yankee for his building \$3.50 and he gets his \$4,000 a year and pays his interest and rent, and he has gone ahead and done the same thing on another site.

FURS FLY HIGH.

New York Fashion-Mirror: A marked increase in the price of fur has been made. A prominent dealer of this city says that Persian fur is the only variety on which he will be able to make the same price as last winter. An illustration of the great increase in the cost of skins is a red fox pelt, which a few seasons ago could be brought for \$2.50 or \$3, and now costs \$12 at wholesale.

To further render the wearing of furs an expensive luxury during the coming season it has been decreed by fashion that boas shall be worn very long, the shortest of them reaching to the knees and the longest to the bottom of the gown. The boas are also to be quite wide, so that it will take a very comfortable number of skins to fabricate a fashionable neck piece. Muffs, not to be outdone, are to contain nearly as much fur in their ornamentation as in their actual construction.

A drop piece of the fur containing the head and shoulders of the animal is to be added to muffs of long-haired fur. This piece will be decorated with two tails also so that when the muff is held with the drop piece falling at full length it will reach nearly to the knees. The "drop" may be rolled up with the muff, so as to appear as if sewed to it. The underside of the "drop" is to be utilized to contain a good-sized pocket, which will be a great convenience. Muffs are to be soft and flat instead of padded into stiff cylinders.

Seakins, which are to be very dear, are to have a great revival of popularity. Chinchilla in spite of its fragility will be in high favor. A newcomer in the market will be natural otter and beaver, which have been absent from popular usage for several years. Dark-colored furs will excel light ones in popularity. Mink and sables will be worn. Combinations of dark with light furs will have a great run.

Shawl collars of a light fur on jackets of broadtail will meet with deserved favor. Coats, especially those of seakins, will be short, scarcely more than Eton length. There will be also some very long coats, but the jacket of medium length has been relegated to the background.

It is now stated that the police have discovered that Signor Scaroni was murdered by his second "wife," who wished to obtain possession of the fortune before the arrival of her husband's brother.
