DEATH AT MILL BRANCH.—Mr. and Mrs. Adam Robinson and family of Mill Branch, Kent Co., have the sincere sympathy of a large number of sorrowing friends and relatives in the death of their eldest son William, who expired at 6.30 o'clock last Wednesday morning, of quinsy and hemorrhage of the lungs, after an illness of about two weeks. Deceased, although a very quiet young man, was well known and much liked in the community in which he lived. Interment took place on Saturday, Rev. Mr. Bailey, of Harcourt, conducting the funeral services. The remains were followed to their last resting place by a large number of mourners.

DEATH AT BUCTOUCHE.—The death of Mr. Peter Nowlan occurred at his home, Little River, Buctouche, Tuesday morning, Nov. 13th. Deceased was 62 years of age. He had been ill for sometime and death was not unexpected. The deceased was a wealthy farmer and was a son of the late Peter Nowlan, a native of Ireland, born in the county of Carlow. He leaves a widow, four sons and three daughters. One of the daughters is married and resides in Boston. The rest of the family lives at home. Mr. Nowlan was a brother of Mr. John P. Nowlan, Mr. Thomas P. Nowlan, Mrs. Philip D. Landry, of Coatsville, Kent, and Mr. Wm. P. Nowlan, of Little River, Buctouche.

DEATH OF AN M. P. P.—The death of Mr. Peter H. Legere, one of Kent's representatives in the provincial legislature, which occurred at his home at Grand Digue, on Monday morning, was due to inflammation of the lungs. The funeral took place on Wednesday morning at nine o'clock, and was very largely attended. Deceased was born at Grand Digue July 14th, 1858, and took a commercial course at St. Joseph's college. He was a farmer and trader and a Justice of the Peace and had sat in the municipal council of Kent. Mr. Legere was first returned to the House of Assembly at the general elections in 1895 and was re-elected in 1899.

DOMINION NEWS.

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—The C. P. R. Halifax express which left Montreal last night for St. John ran into a freight train which was standing on the siding at St. Philippe. The express was pulling into the siding to permit a westbound train to pass, and in some unexplained manner collided with the freight, derailing the express engine. When replaced on the rails it was found the engine was not damaged and was able to proceed with its train after several hours delay.

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—The funeral of the late Mgr. Quinan, vicar general of Antigonish, will take place in the chapel of Grey Nunnery to-morrow morning. Requiem Mass will be chanted by Mgr. Racicot, and interment will be made in the crypt of the chapel.

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—It is stated here that a new company to operate a pulp mill at Musquash, New Brunswick, will shortly apply for incorporation. The capital stock will be \$100,000, divided into twenty shares of \$5,000 each, and held entirely by Canadian capitalists, principally Montreal men. Part of the stock will be held by St. John men, including Messrs. George McAvity, H. R. McLellan, George W. Jones and Franklin Stetson. Messrs. Charles Burriel, Weymouth, and B. F. Pearson, Halifax, are also interested in the company.
