DEATH AT NOTRE DAME.—The death of Mrs. Carroll, widow of the late Wm. Carroll occurred at Notre Dame, Kent Co., N. B., on Tuesday, Dec. 4th, of paralysis after an illness of two months' duration. The funeral took place on Friday and was largely attended. The pallbearers were Messrs. Wm. Johnston, Geo. Johnston, Peter Richard and Edward Sonier. The interment was made in the Roman Catholic burying ground at Notre Dame. Mrs. Carroll was born in the city of Dublin, Ireland, in 1824, and came to Canada with her parents when she was quite young, where they settled on a farm in Cocagne. She married in 1845 to Mr. Wm. Carroll of this place where she resided until the time of her death. She leaves surviving three sons and one daughter who have the sympathy of the whole community. The sons are John, of Notre Dame, N. B., Joseph, of Boston, and Thomas, of Minnesota, and the daughter is Mrs. John Kane, of Boston.

OBITUARY.—The funeral of the late Mrs. David Sinton, of West Galloway took place Dec. 10. During recent years, such severe frost and high winds have not characterized a parallel day. Under circumstances, many who would gladly have been present were unable to attend. The deceased had been for years a sufferer from dyspepsia. Recently she paid a visit to friends in Boston, where, in August, she contracted a cough. Since her return symptoms of quick consumption developed, to which she succumbed Dec. 7th in the 49th year of her age. She patiently bore her affliction in submission to the Divine Will, and frequently repeated aloud the line, "There is sweet rest in Heaven." She leaves a husband, widowed mother and sorrowing brothers and sisters to mourn their loss. The pall bearers were Messrs. Matthew Little, James Little, Robert Little, David Sinton, John Sinton and James McNairn. Rev. Mr. Fraser, Kingston, conducted service at the home. One selection sung was the familiar hymn "The hour of my departure come," a favorite with deceased.

THE DEATH OF P. H. LEGER, M. P. P.—Mr. Peter H. Leger, M. P. P., died of inflammation of the lungs at his home in Grandique on Monday morning Dec. 3rd. Mr. Leger had been ill only a few days, but not being very robust, he succumbed to the attack. The funeral took place on Wednesday and, considering the great snow storm which set in the evening previous, was largely attended. The parish church was draped in mourning and the burial services, conducted by the pastor Rev. Ph. Bellevue, assisted by Revs. LeBlanc, Michaud and LaPointe, were beautiful and impressive. The pallbearers were Raphael Leger, Peter LeBlanc, Albert J. Dysart, Henry Gallant, Fred Poirier and Maxime Poirier. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery adjoining the church grounds. Mr. Leger who was a brother of the late Dr. E. H. Leger, was born at Grandique on June 29, 1858, and was consequently 42 years of age at his death. He received his early education at his parish school, and later spent several years at St. Joseph's University, Memraucook. Entering life, he engaged in school teaching and farming, and within the last few years he profitably combined farming and trading. He sat in the Municipal Council of Kent, and was in 1895 elected to the Provincial Assembly, and was re-elected at the head of the poll in 1898. As a representative he was conscientious and painstaking, and gained most of his great popularity by closely attending to the needs of his constituents. Mr. Leger was twice married, first in 1880 to Miss Justine Gallant, who died six years later, and again in 1888 to Miss Christine Hebert, who survives him. Six children are left behind to mourn for a kind father and along with their mother to receive the consolation of many deep sympathizers. Mr. Leger was prominently connected with the C. M. B. A. and other societies, and was a leading spirit in all movements towards advancement.
