THE WORLD OVER.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—The Journal and Advertiser prints the following: "Telegram received late last night from an inside source from Nebraska, says Bryan is to be made United States senator. D. E. Thompson of Lincoln, republican, has ten votes to do with absolutely as he pleases. The democrats and populists lack but five votes. The fashionists can agree upon no man but Bryan. Byran, it is understood, has agreed to accept the place as the only way of preventing two republicans being elected. Thompson and Bryan will combine.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13.—A careful estimate of the total yield of gold from the Klondike and Alaska, including Nome for the present year has been completed by a smelting company, acting in conjunction with the statistician of the San Francisco mint. The amount aggregates \$25,724,223.81, divided as follows: Klondike, \$21,358,329.17; Nome, 4,367,894.61.

HONG KONG, Dec. 13.—The city was placarded to-day with statements inciting the people and the members of the secret societies to unite and rise during the month of January and drive out all the foreigners. Crowds gathered around the placards, but no actual outbreak was reported. Reports have been received from Canton to the effect that Yeung Sung Po, the reformer, has been horribly tortured. Though he was strung up by the thumbs and the toes, he would confess nothing.

PEKIN, Dec. 13.—A few days ago the British troops were notified of the existence of a large amount of treasure twenty miles northwest. Colonel Tullock and a hundred men left to-day to investigate. Col. Tullock requested, however, that fifty extra men be detailed; it is believed that a large amount of gold and valuables were buried at that point by persons connected with the Chinese court during the recent flight. The information regarding the treasure was received from a former court official.

Negotiations are in progress for the chartering of five tramp steamships which will carry from Philadelphia 11,800 tons of steel rails to Norway for the state railways.

The Antarctic expedition headed by Dr. Otto Nordenskjold will leave Christiania in August.

The German second class cruisers Bertha, Hansa and Irene have escaped being frozen in at the Taku roads, China, and all the other German vessels are in ice-free harbors and waters.

BUTTE, Mont., Dec. 13.—A special to the Miner from Great Falls, Mont., says, Great Northern passenger train No. 3, westbound, was wrecked near Brockton, 81 miles east of Glasgow, by the breaking of a truck. Four passengers were killed and many injured. The dead are: Aged woman, name unknown; her daughter; Mrs. Watson, residence unknown; Russian child, name unknown.

Ernest Brenner, of Bale, has been elected president of Switzerland for 1901. Dr. J. Zemp, of Lucerne, has been elected vice-president.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—The Rev. Isaac Samuel, first reader in the Bridgewater synagogue, is quoted in a London despatch to the Journal and Advertiser as saying of his son, Sydney Samuel's death: "My son, who was a business man in Mexico, left London only a few weeks ago, after spending six weeks at Rome. By the last mail I received a cheerful letter from him, written soon after landing. I cannot imagine why he committed suicide, for certainly he left here a sane, well man." The father denied that his desire that his son should not marry a woman author and playwright caused him to kill himself.

BURLINGTON, Conn., Dec. 12.—The Chicago B. and Q. railway's fast mail, No. 15, which left Chicago at 9.15 last evening, was wrecked three miles west of Kirkwood, early to-day. Fireman Shannon was killed, and Engineer Samuel Dove was badly hurt. The engine jumped the track and was demolished. Two mail cars, with their contents, were burned. The mail clerks were not injured severely.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The Westmorland Coal Company has been formed in New Jersey, with a capital stock of \$2,500,000. It proposes to take over 38,000 acres of coal land in Westmorland county, New Brunswick, Canada. The company will be operated on the same lines as the Dominion Coal Company, the stock of which is largely held in Boston.

DUNKIRK, N. Y., Dec. 15.—Seven persons perished by fire, which destroyed the Fredonia State Normal and Training School this morning. Six lady students and the janitor are missing. Loss \$200,000. The grief-stricken parents are arriving to assist in the search for their dead.
