THE LAST WORD.

We go to press a day earlier than usual this issue which gives us the opportunity of saying a final word to our readers in regard to the political campaign which closes to-morrow. We believe the issue above all others in the present elections for the people of Canada to decide in which of the two political parties if successful is the more likely to benefit the people. Questions of purely party character dwart into insignificance when each elector sits down and calmly measures up the situation as it appears to his own interests. If our people know that they have been in easier circumstances since 1896 than they were before then, and believe that the government is capable of continuing their success, it would be very short-sighted to vote the Liberals out of power because their opponents want to be returned to office. We have never heard of an opposition that did not want to be in government, nor have we ever known a people so foolish as to gratify their whim without some fixed idea that the change would benefit the country. To-day the Conservative candidates are practically saying, elect us for our party sake, and if you won't elect us for our party sake, then elect us for pity sake. But elect us. The reply of the electorate in Kent to-morrow should be to deposit their ballots for the government candidate, Hon. O. J. LeBlanc, not for any benefit it may be to him, but for the benefit Mr. LeBlanc will assuredly be to the County of Kent. From every standpoint the election of Mr. Geo. V. McInerney would be a mistake, and though his friends and nearest relatives claim that Mr. McInerney is in a position to buy the conscience of Kent, we have no doubt of the result. Our people will resent the imputation that they are for sale to Geo. V. McInerney, and by the return of Hon. O. J. LeBlanc will set their seal of disapproval on the rowdy tactics and mean canvasses used against him in this campaign.

Vote for the Hon. O. J. LeBlanc.

That the Government will be returned to power is not even questioned by the most enthusiastic Tories. The people of Kent want to fall into line and support the liberal candidate, thus strengthening the hands of the Hon. A. G. Blair who has done so much for this County and Province generally.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

There is no hatred more vicious than the renegades, as Mr. McInerney has shown by publishing the contents of confidential letters. Mr. McInerney's code of honor is different than that held by decent men.

We trust that the friends of the Hon. O. J. LeBlanc will see there is no stuffing of ballot boxes to-morrow as there was in 1896. It is as hard to teach an old dog new tricks as to convince a certain section of the machinery gang that they are not the people of Kent.

We always claimed that Mr. McInerney talked against time. He himself proved it on Nomination Day. Every hour he talked lost him a hundred votes.

If our people appreciate the extension and improvement of the I. C. Ry and would like to see it still more useful to our people, they will vote for the Hon. O. J. LeBlanc.

If our people prefer to have Canada dominated by the C. P. Ry they will vote for Geo. V. McInerney, who voted against the I. C. R. extension to Montreal.

To-morrow decides that we are to have five more years of Liberal prosperity for Canada.

When Sir Charles Tupper gets the returns from the different parts of Canada he will find that his "logical deductions of 1900" are as far astray as his "prophecies" of 1896.

We want the world to know that Geo. V. McInerney holds the monopoly in Kent for publishing correspondence that was private and confidential. No one desires to share the honor with him.

The retirement of T. Medley Richards, the Tory candidate for Victoria-Madawaska, gives the Liberals one seat in New Brunswick already. Sir Charles told us we would not get one. We hope to give the Liberals another here in Kent.

Fosterism is to be buried in New Brunswick to-morrow and the late member for Kent is to be one of the pall bearers.

It took Mr. McInerney two hours and three-quarters to tell the people on Nomination Day why he had done nothing for Kent in 9 years. We could have explained the reason in one sentence.

In 1905 we may expect to have Mr. McInerney publish the confidential letters sent him lately in connection with the "wad" by his conservative friends.

Mr. Geo. McInerney never thought when he handed over to Foster the private letter which he received in 1891 from the late respected C. W. Weldon, ex-M. P., that it would rather prove a boomerang against himself. He speaks of boodle. What became of the money Mercier sent him in 1891 to assist him as a liberal candidate? He is now loud in his condemnation of Mercier, of Quebec, as a boodler, but yet he went to Quebec and begged for money from this same Mercier for his election fund and now denounces the source from which he obtained aid in his candidature of 1891.

Government Candidate FOR KENT OLIVER J. LeBLANC. X

Let all our readers see that the ballot cast by them on November 7th has a cross marked after the name of the HON. O. J. LeBLANC. By so doing they will be voting for honest, intelligent and progressive administration of Canadian affairs.

The Tory party have been driven to fearful tactics during this campaign. They issued the bogus "Globe" which was nothing short of forgery and was a most disreputable transaction, so much so that Hiram Calvin, the Conservative candidate for Frontenac, would not permit its distribution in his County. Having succeeded with the "Globe" forgery the Tories have become a little more bold in their criminal procedure.

Last week the tory press printed a circular letter accusing the Quebec liberals of annexion, &c., a regular appeal to the racial passions of the English electors against the liberal party. This circular was issued as confidential by the tory organizer, Henry Dalby, of Montreal, and purported to be signed by all the Conservative candidates of Quebec. It has been found that in at least four cases the names of these gentlemen, Louis Tache, A. A. Moudon, Trefle Charpentier and L. J. Tonsignant, have been forged, as they neither signed it nor had they seen or heard of the circular before being issued. The Tories must be driven to fearful straits when they resort to criminal acts of the worst kind to influence the electorate. It lies with the people of Canada to administer a well deserved rebuke to the tory party for such proceedings, and by voting united for the liberal candidates this can be accomplished.

Why has Tupper suddenly left for Cape Breton and cancelled his Ontario trip? Because he has found that even to save his own neck he must devote all his time until election in his own constituency and further because the statements of Laurier and his colleagues have completely destroyed the tory hope in Ontario.

Ontario has always gone liberal and is going liberal again. The cry of the Tories that they are going to sweep New Brunswick looks well in the newspapers, but wait until they see how it looks on the ballots to-morrow.

Fowler, the tory candidate of Kings, says he can buy the electorate of his county with a two dollar bill and a glass of rum. This is the insulting way the tory candidates speak of respectable farmers. He is another turncoat, only his acrobatic feats have been of triple character. Mr. McInerney has to make one more turn to be even with Mr. Fowler.

The liberals drew first blood in New Brunswick by electing the Hon. John Costigan by acclamation on Wednesday last.

The Tories propose to hand over to the C. P. R. the main line of the I. C. R. between St. John and Halifax. What will become of the northern division of the I. C.

R. and the city of Moncton? The former will become a second rate branch line and the latter a deserted village. McInerney and Powell are supporting the scheme.

McInerney has raised all kinds of cries and said many disreputable things during this campaign, but to publish the late Mr. Weldon's letter shows he has no judgment and no conscience.

The English speaking people of New Brunswick have a very poor opinion and very little confidence in Geo. V. McInerney. The publication of the Weldon letter has justified them in both.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell told the truth when he said the names of Haggart and Foster "stank in the nostrils of the people of Ontario" If they are odiferous in the West, they are even more so in New Brunswick. The marble heart of Foster cannot remove the odour attached to his name.

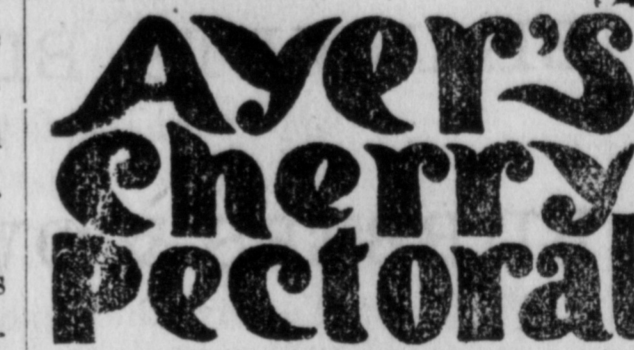

A combined construction of a Post-office and Custom House in our Shire-town.

Breakwaters along the shore to facilitate fishermen getting under shelter in heavy storms, between main harbours. Gentlemen:—

In conclusion, I have my past experience and political career to offer you as a guarantee for the above pledges. With the help and advice of my constituents I hope to fulfil satisfactorily the aforesaid promises advantageously both to you and myself.
