GORED TO DEATH.—A distressing story comes from Buctouche to the effect that a man named Allen, living at St. Mary's, was gored to death by a cow on Tuesday last under very peculiar circumstances. It is said that Allen found a cow in his turnip field and was so exasperated that he tied the animal up and subjected her to a brutal beating. The tortured beast broke the rope and turned on her unfortunate persecutor and gored him to death. The tragedy, if as reported, is particularly distressing.

Further particulars of a Buctouche fatality by which a man named Allen lost his life in a rather miraculous manner, are to hand. The unfortunate man's name was Lucas Louis Allen. He was 50 years of age, unmarried and lived in the parish of St. Mary's on the south side of the Buctouche river. It appears that Allen had tied the cow to a stake and was beating her with a stick. The animal in her efforts to escape from her tormentor in some miraculous manner wound the rope about Allen's neck and managed to pull up the stake to which she was tied. Infuriated by the brutal beating administered, the cow dashed across the field, dragging her helpless victim after her. Before he was extricated from his position, his shoulder was broken and his chest crushed in. The unfortunate affair occurred on Saturday, Oct. 27th, and Allen died of his injuries the following Monday.

THREE NEW BEAVER LINERS.

Messrs. Elder, Dempster & Company have just contracted for three new steamers for the firm's Canadian trade to run under their Beaver line flag. The order for two of these ships is placed with Messrs. C. S. Swan and Hunter, Limited, Wallsend-on-Tyne, the contract for the remaining one being placed at Newcastle. The ships will be of the twin screw type having a cargo capacity of 19,000 tons, and of comparatively light draft for St. Lawrence navigation. This is only a portion of the immense shipbuilding programme which Messrs. Elder, Dempster & Co. have in view.

ALLEGED BURGLARS CAUGHT.

FREDERICTON, Nov. 3.—Officers Foster and Wolverton, of Woodstock, captured in a school house at Barney, Dufferin, early this morning, the two men for whom they have been hunting for some days past and who are believed to be the persons who blew open the C. P. R. safe at Houlton and another one at Florenceville, and who attempted to crack still another one at Richmond, Carleton county. The names of the men are unknown. They drove to Millville with a horse they got at Woodstock and yesterday crossed over to the western side of the river from Bear Island. Last night some neighbors observed smoke issuing from the chimney of the school house and upon investigation discovered two men warming themselves around the stove. Officers Foster and Wolverton were up above Hawkshaw. Word was sent to them and they, with the assistance of several residents of the locality, effected the capture. The prisoners were taken to Woodstock. They are described as a hard looking pair.



THIS BUSY WORLD.




