INTEMPERANCE.

Mr. J. M. Christian, of St. Johns, Nfld., has sent us a diagram of "The Drunkard's Clock," and what it leads to, namely, a coffin or a gallows. On each side it is flanked by a hideous snake, with the legend, "At the last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." The description of the clock is as follows:

Here we have the Drunkard's Clock. There are twelve numbers or letters upon its dial, which represent twelve stages or periods in the life of a drunkard.

Connect the letters beginning at 1, and you have that word which stands for untold suffering—INTEMPERANCE.

The majority of drunkards are made in youth. We are unable to fix the limit when the tippler passes the stage of the moderate drinker and becomes the drunkard. The process is not completed in a day; but the evolution of the drinker, from the youth with his first glass, to the drunkard with glasses many, is usually appallingly rapid. - (1) I. Indolence—Rarely you see a drunkard possessing much energy or go. His habits usually are slothful and lazy.
- (2) N. Neglect—Of person, business, wife, children, and home.
- (3) T. Trouble—Physical, mental, social and financial, surely follows the empty pleasures of the wine cup.
- (4) E. Excess—One hundred per cent. of beginners claim that they can keep to the moderate drinker's point; but ninety-nine per cent. soon overstep the mark and drink to excess.
- (5) M. Misery—Always goes hand in hand with drunkenness.
- (6) P. Poverty—Strong drink smashes the furniture, empties the flour barrel, denudes wife and children, drains the purse.
- (7) E. Enslaved—As the unceasing hand of time goes round, and the weight of sin grows heavier, the drinker reaches the point when he realizes that he is surely fettered hand and foot.
- (8) R. Ruin—Character is soon lost, body emaciated, mind brutalized, and home destroyed.
- (9) A. Anguish—Awful pangs of anguish of spirit seize the deluded victim, and soon the stage is reached when he feels that for him there is—
- (10) N. No hope—What an awful realization!
- (11) C. Crime—In a drunken frenzy he one day either destroys himself or enters the doorway of the place he calls home, and dashes the life out of his patient, heart-broken wife, or half-starved and half-naked child.
- (12) E. End—The hand of time has slowly but surely gone round. The weight of sin has dragged its victim down, down, down. He reaches the end—"At the last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder."

Another drunkard's grave is dug, and filled with one more victim of strong drink, while the murdering demon, leaving the havoc it has wrought, goes forth with reeking maw, to claim a fresh victim for its insatiable appetite.

WORDS OF WISDOM.

Dr. Cuyler, in The Christian at Work, makes this summary: "After forty years of hard work in the good cause, I have reached the following conclusion: 1. Stringent law for the suppression of all dram shops, when backed by the majority of the people in any locality, is the most effectual method of dealing with the drink curse. 2. I agree with D. L. Moody's late declaration in Edinburgh, that 'a dead law is worse than no law'. 3. There is too much reliance on legislation to remove the terrible curse, and there is too little moral and educational effort to break up the drinking usages. We need more of the old-fashioned total abstinence organizations, and more suasion work in pulpits, Sunday-schools, and press and platform. There is not enough moral steam to drive our machinery. 4. We must fight the battle in social life as well as the accursed saloons. 5. Our 'third party' brethren must stop denouncing all temperance men and women who prefer to fight the drink curse outside of their regiments. 6. Millions of dollars are being made by medicines and nostrums for 'curing drunkenness,' but very little money is spent in teaching people not to drink at all. Total abstinence as a prevention is worth all the nostrums yet invented. 7. God's voice to his church now is to grapple with the monster, with the weapons of pledge and prayer, argument and votes."

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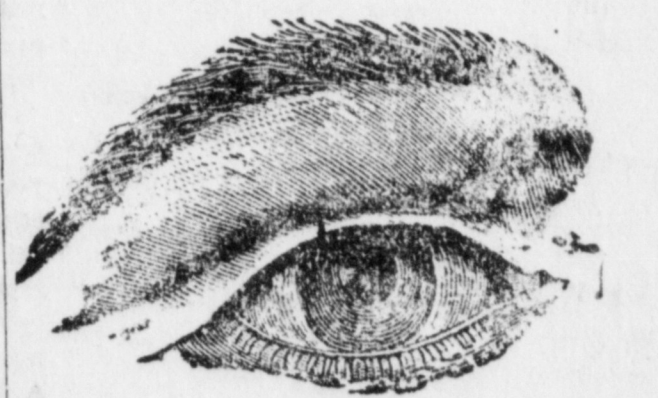
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
