### THE EXPENDITURE.

Our tory friends are fond of pointing to the increased expenditure in Canada as an evidence of the extravagance of the government, forgetting that the largely increased services of Canada since 1896 would justify a very much greater expenditure than has actually been made. Sir Hibbert Tupper in 1896 made a statement in regard to this question which our tory friends have overlooked:

"I take the responsibility of saying that whether my party or the other party be successful at the next election I have not the slightest doubt that the expenditure of this country will increase instead of diminish. And I will go further and say that, provided wisdom presides over the system of management and expenditure, I hope, and devoutly hope, that the expenditure will increase instead of diminish. This country as it grows, this country as it successfully develops, certainly this country as it accumulates a larger population, will, and must require a larger amount than forty millions a year for its government."

### CANADA IS WELL SATISFIED WITH LAURIER.

"I believe the people will return this government to power, for two reasons: First, because the record of this government is good; and, second, because, even if its record were not good, they would rather have this government than go back to the government of 1896. We shall appeal to the country, Sir, with a record of which any government and any country may be proud. We will point to a record of four years of good government—four years of clean government, unstained by the blotches which mark the career of hon. gentlemen opposite; four years of splendid development of Canada, both in her material interests and her national advancement; four years of remarkable success in the financial and commercial development of this country; four years of a truly Imperial policy, which has given Canada a position in the eyes of the Empire and the world such as she never occupied before; four years of that kind of settled government which commands the confidence of capital and of industry; four years of busy activity among the working classes of Canada, who have found themselves busier, happier and more prosperous than ever before; four years of peace, instead of that condition of affairs which at one time threat-

ened this country with serious differences of a religious character—four years of peace, four years of progress, four years of such prosperity as this country never before knew."—Hon. W. S. Fielding.

### THE POSTAL STORY.

The Tories charge that the liberals have been extravagant and do not know how to manage the business of Canada.

Let them turn to the Post Office Department. The deficit ranged from 1889-1895 between \$650,000 to \$801,000 a year. Under Liberal administration the deficit was reduced to \$47,602. At the same time the postal mileage was increased 1,438,095 miles and the number of Post-offices by 317.

How was this accomplished? By honest business management by the Hon. Wm. Mulock. The tory ministers said the two cent postage in Canada and to the United States was impossible as it would mean a deficit in the department of \$1,250,000 a year, while a penny postage to Great Britain and colonies was unthought of.

The liberals reduced the postage to two cents not only in Canada and to United States, but also gave the penny postage to Great Britain and Colonies, and the deficit for all combined is not over \$300,000 for first year of new system less than one quarter of the sum predicted by the Tories. The impossible of the Tories has been accomplished by the liberals and the deficit is very small compared with the deficit under the old high postage rates of the Conservative Administration.

The Tories called for tenders for carrying mails and in 330 cases never opened the tenders, but awarded them to favorites at two prices.

Hon. Wm. Mulock cancelled the fraudulent tenders and called for new ones. In this way he saved \$415,000 to the country and improved the service.

The ratio of deficit to revenue in the Post-office Department was from 25 to 30 per cent. under the tory administration, while under the liberal management it was only 1.35 per cent. under like conditions. This is genuine business management by the Government and not cooked accounts.

Do you find any tory speakers giving the liberals credit for the business like management of the Post-office Department? The record of the liberal administration is beyond reproach and they know it.

Foster in all his speeches never refers to the "cooked accounts" of the Post-office Department. Why did he never place in the Postmaster General's report for 1894-5-6 that for years he had been exceeding his parliamentary appropriation and had unpaid bills of over \$600,000 in the Department?

In 1895 the revenue of the Post-office was \$2,792,789.64 and expenditure \$3,593,647.47; this was under the tory regime.

In 1898 when the liberals had obtained control the revenue was \$3,527,809.69 and the expenditure \$3,575,411.99, notwithstanding they were carrying mails over more than 1,000,000 more miles than in 1895 and had 300 more post-offices than in the Conservative period. And yet in the face of this magnificent showing, Tupper, McDonald, Foster & Co. ask you to put the liberals out and let them show you how to spend money.

One of the main questions for the electorate to settle in this contest is whether the Liberal administration of the past four years has been an improvement of the years of tory rule which preceded it. All except hide bound partisans cannot give any other than an affirmative answer.

The Conservative party in New Brunswick are greatly exercised lest the privileges of the C. P. Ry. should be curtailed by the Hon. A. G. Blair. It is a startling thought to the tory mind to realize that we now have in Canada "a government of the people, by the people, for the people."

The prediction of a government majority of 50 in the next house would seem to be a moderate estimate if we are to judge from the fact that they only suggest a majority of 10 from the Maritime Provinces. Why, New Brunswick alone will give 6 at least out of this majority of 10 and probably more.

Among the prominent supporters of the Laurier Government on the platform at the public meeting in Fredericton, N. B., on Thursday evening last, was Mr. J. D. Phinney, Q. C., former member for this County in the House of Assembly.

It is said to be as difficult for the Liberals to capture the entire 14 seats in this Province as it is with a perfect hand to take the entire 13 tricks at whist. We just give our tory friends notice that we are after that thirteenth trick this election.

Kent prefers to support the government and its candidate, Hon. O. J. LeBlanc, to taking pity on the oft rejected of this county, Mr. Geo. V. McInerney.

It was rumored that Mr. McInerney was desirous of assisting Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the monster demonstration in Quebec as he did in 1891. We might say that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has no use for a played out political acrobat of the stamp of Geo. V. McInerney.

Beware of misrepresentation and misleading canvasses on the part of the opposition to Hon. O. J. LeBlanc. We are in a position to state that Mr. McInerney has not yet turned Liberal again and any advances from him will be promptly rejected by the Government.

What has Mr. Geo. V. McInerney done for the County of Kent or the Province of New Brunswick? He opposed the extension of the I. C. Ry. to Montreal and every other measure beneficial to this County or Province.

The attempt to stampede the English speaking electors of this County against the Hon. O. J. LeBlanc has proved a dismal failure. For the first time in many federal elections the two races are united in a common support of the government candidate.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—Last Thursday night about seven o'clock a very sad drowning accident occurred at Kingston, when a young man about 22 years of age by the name of Donat LeBlanc, lost his life. The young man belonged to Buctouche Bay and had only been in Kingston a short while, having been employed with Mr. Pascal Hebert as clerk in his store. On the above mentioned night he went to the new bridge to open the draw to let the Tug Calluna pass through, when by some unaccountable manner walked over the end of the draw. The accident, it is believed, was due to the darkness of the night and the heavy gale of wind which was blowing at the time. His only companion was a small boy who cried out for help when he saw the young man fall, but before any help could arrive the young man was drowned. Nothing that night could be done on account of the darkness, but since then every effort has been put forth to find the body which so far has been without avail. Grappling irons have been used and two large boom shells were thrown into the river but these have proved unsuccessful. His sorrowing relatives have the sympathy of the whole community. A reward of \$100.00 is offered for the body.

Parliament being dissolved, the people are again asked to choose from among them a representative to see after their interests at Ottawa.

Having been chosen as candidate at a Convention, composed of all nationalities, held at Buctouche on the 19th day of September last, as the Liberal standard bearer, in and for the Electoral District of Kent, I then accepted the candidature.
