DEATH AT RICHIBUCTO VILLAGE.—The death occurred at Richibucto Village on Monday, the 17th inst., of Mrs. Rubin S. Maillet, nee Mary F. Richard, of inflammation of the lungs, aged 47 years. Deceased was a sister of ex-councillor J. F. Richard and was only sick twelve days. She was married 9 years ago to Rubin S. Maillet, who survives her. She also leaves two brothers and one sister, Jos. F. and John F., and Mrs. Phileas Boudreau, of Black River, Buctouche, also her aged mother. The funeral took place on Thursday morning and was largely attended. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Martineau. The interment was made in the R. C. cemetery at the Village. The pall-bearers were Messrs. John C. Richard, Maxime S. Maillet, Jos. M. Richard, Frank Richard, Phileas Boudreau and Albert Boudreau.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN TAYLOR.—Mr. John Taylor died at his residence in Kingston on Friday afternoon, Dec. 21st. He had been ailing for several years, but was only confined to his bed about a fortnight. He bore his suffering with great resignation and calm fortitude. He leaves a widow and an adopted son. To them and the rest of the sorrowing friends our deepest sympathy is extended in their sore bereavement. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon, the service in the house being conducted by his pastor, Rev. D. Fraser, assisted by Rev. H. A. Meek. The choir rendered very feelingly "The Lord's my Shepherd" and "Asleep in Jesus." The service at the grave was in charge of the Masonic Fraternity of which the deceased was a consistent and devoted member for the past fifty years. The pallbearers were Messrs. R. A. Irving, Wm. Scott, John Palmer, Hugh Jardine, John Cameron and Robert Phinney.

SCHOOL EXAMINATIONS.—The usual public examinations were conducted in the different departments of our school last week, but not many of our townspeople availed themselves of the opportunity to show an interest in the progress of the pupils. In the Grammar Department a much larger attendance of the friends than hitherto appeared to arouse the scholars to a strong desire to excel themselves and to all present it must have been evident that excellent work was being done here. Several prizes were awarded by friends, the presentations being made by Rev. H. A. Meek. The prize winners were Nellie Stewart, Gladys Hudson, Hilda Robertson, Eugene Leger, Austin Weeks and Willie McDonald. It was suggested that the friends of the school and children donate a few prizes to be awarded at the close of the next term. We trust there will be a ready and liberal response made to this suggestion.
