

OBSERVATIONS ON THE TEMPER ANCE MOVEMENT IN GREAT BRITAIN.

We have always been told that we, on this side of the Atlantic, could not appreciate the difficulties of temperance workers on the "other side," and I thought I realized the situation; only to find that in this, as in many other matters, I had formed a misconception which experience only served to rectify, not having conceived of the difficulties which to us would seem most discouraging and yet our brave workers labor on most hopetully nothing daunted. I would bespeak Tallyhos from their Saturday's excursions for them and their contemporaries a daily remembrance at our noon-tide hour of prayer where about fifty thousand White Ribboners, round this Globe, mingle their petitions to our Heaven's Father's throne. Some of our oldest Canadian workers remarked "Why they are only where we begin in Canada"-Struggling to arouse public opinion sufficiently to procure some restriction in licenses, to prevent the sale of liquor to children under sixteen years of age, to obtain the Sunday closing law in England.

Pitiful in the extreme was it to witness on London streets the countless numbers of children of all ages wending their way to the "public house" with pitchers, jugs, bottles, mugs, broken or whole, anything to carry away the ale or beer served "on top." One's heart ached as we noted their worn pinched faces peering from under the customary shawl, and felt their apparently hopeless condition. On looking within the public house you find it crowded, packed to the doar with a swaying mass of humanity, men women and children all drinking-served from the tap-drink, drink, drink; one is led to wonder if they ever do anything but drink. Many public houses have a separate entrance for "ladies" indicated by a plate on the door, and I have watched the women meeting so as to enter together, sometimes stopping to count their pennies beforehand. One cannot get away from the drink. The indispensable wine glass confronts you on every table. Sometimes three of them, and the "Wine List" is of paramount importance. Your waiter first asks, "What drinks Sir?" and because it is "only cold water" you are the last to be served.

Of the Royal Commission which has excited considerable stir among temperance workers Miss Slack reports: "The Royal Commissions on licenses so ably presided over by Lord Peel, has brought home to the minds of a large number of in the preservation of the Holy Sabbath social reformers the urgent need which day, for the past forty years or more, why exists for license -reform and for the curtailment of the liquor traffic. required information. It was the mass of good citizens who do little or nothing to help the Temperance reformation mainly because they are ignorant of its enormous importance. The majority of the commission, a large proportion of whom were direct representatives of the trade, reported that-"It is undeniable that a gigantic evil remains to be remedied and that hardly any sacrifice would be too great which would result in a marked diminuition of this national degradation." Lady Henry Somerset on the same question remarks in connection with "our nations greed for gold." "Was it conceivable that after three years examination of the liquor question, and after men who went with the Royal Commission absolutely unbiased had come out convinced as to the mischief of the trade, the legislature should be absolutely unwilling to hear the results of the commission they themselves had appointed—was this conceivable from any other point of view save from the fact that as a nation they were tempted to sell Christ for thirty pieces of silver."

The position of the British Government on the temperance question will easily le recognized when you see that they were so completely astonished and overwhelmed by the results of the commission as to wish to ignore the whole report. But the B. W. T. A. with other temperance associations are strongly supporting Lord Peel's report and urging on their case.

So far as my knowledge goes there is absolutely no restriction on public houses in England. They are open every day and all day, night as well. Ireland and Wales enjoy a Sunday closing law, and Scotland has been the happy possessor of such a law for forty-three years.

In beautiful Edinburgh Sunday is indeed "a day of rest and gladness, a day of pure delights," no sound of noisy trains disturbs the serenity of the atmosphere, the public house has not even its back door open, loungers are nowhere to be seen. I have heard the Scottish religion termed "A sweet habit of the blood," and so it would seem for apparently everyone attended Kirk. In the early morning we look from our hotel window on beau. tiful Princess street, claimed to be the most beautiful street in the world, and it is with absolute amazement we gaze at the perfect serenity and calmness of the whole aspect, for was it not from that very window only about six or seven hours previous that we had witnessed a horrible display of the evil side of human nature under the influence of Scotch whiskey? Was it not directly opposite us at the post-office corner we had seen the deposit a drunken crowd, many of whom, father, mother, children, visited the public house beneath us before departing for their homes; young men and young women reeling about the street; the "picket" out to bring in their drunken comrades; busses and trains laden with "jolly" crowds. Where were all these people? Where were the hundreds we had seen as we walked through High street, down Canongate and Cowgate, at one time the regal district of the "Old Town," Grassmarket, the scene of the martyrdom of saints, but where now the police "go in fours." Hundreds of pa le crowding not only the sidewalks but the roads, and reeling and jostling one another, among whom we threaded our way, mostly without comment because the majority seemed stupified with drink; many sitting on the sidewalks propped up against the houses, their little children grovelling about them, many lying on the curbstone, or about the lamp posts. Dancing, singing ribald songs in clusters about us, fighting in some quarters, and the police marching up and down, boxing this one's ears, giving that one a rade shake, pulling the fighting women from one another by their hair and generally endeavouring to prevent a riot; for no arrests can be made unless the offender is committed by another. Why? there is no room for them, the jails are full. As we turned away with aching hearts from this scene and our eyes beheld that old historic fortress, Edinburgh Castle, our minds reverted to the dark deed of long ago, with a feeling that perhaps the crimes of our ancestry were not so heinous as we are wont to picture them in the height of all we had just witnessed. And so the great contrast between an Edinburgh Saturday night and Sunday morning, can scarcely be imagined and is painful in the extreme. Since these staunch Scottish advocates of truth and justice have succeeded so admirably can they not see the wisdom of extending their jurisdiction over other days in the week. What a strange contradiction?

# DOMINION NEWS.

TORONTO, Dec. 19 -Mrs. Evans, widow of the late ex-Ald. George Evans, was run over by a trolley car this afternoon, and died in the emergency hospital in an

MONTREAL, Dec. 19.-Judge Ma hieu gave judgment to-day in the ejectment suit against Thos A. Temple & Son for \$900 rent and damages at the instance of the trustees of the St. James Methodist church, owners of the buildings in which the office of the Victoria Montreal Insurance Co, is situated.

MONTREAL, Dec. 19 .- Judge Alphonse Ouimet died suddenly at his residence here last night. He was 55 years old. He was a member of the commission appointed to consider the half-breed claims and soon afterwards was appointed to the Superior Court bench. Six years ago he was transferred to the Court of Queen's bench. He was a cousin of Judge Alderic Ouimet; the ex-Minister of Public Works.

OTTAWA, Dec. 19 -The Governor General has accepted the invitation of the Toronto garrison to attend the banquet in Col. Otter's honor next week. It is understood that the Minister of Inland Revenue has recommended the appointment of the commission to investigate matters in connection with the complaints of British purchasers of Canadian grain as to the character of the certificates on which the grain was forwarded.

QUEBEC, Dec. 20.-T. D. Shipman, for many years Grand Trunk and Intercolonial ticket agent here, and proprietor of the St. Lawrence Hall, Cacouna, died this morning.

MONTEAL, Dec. 20. - Ald. Larru died suddenly this morning of pneumonia. He was president of the Butcher's Association and achieved considerable notority in connection with Bonseecour market bonus scandal, in which it was charged he was Commissioner of the Richibucto Civil implicated.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.-E W. B. Morrison, in a letter to the Citizen in regard to the fighting near Belfast says:

"The Boers were as angry as hornets because the houses were being burned. During the afternoon they captured Major Bliss of Ottawa, and were going to shoot him. He was acting as galloper for the general and had his horse shot under him. However, after taking his belts and spurs they let him go. After his horse was shot he ran for it and refused to 'hands up' when they galloped after him and surrounded him. They called him a fool and asked why he didn't surrender. He said the Canadians were not in the 'hands up' business."

Major Bliss is employed in the militia department and is a son-in-law of Hon. John Costigan.

BARRIE, Ont., Dec. 20.—Thomas Lennox, his daughter and daughter-in-law, were struck and instantly killed this morning by a light engine on the Grand Trunk crossing fifteen miles west of here and less than ten rods from their home, which they had just left to attend market. Lennox evidently saw the engine approaching, as he whipped up the team, endeavoring to cross ahead of it. The engine crashed into the rig, killing all the occupants and also both borses.

TORONTO, Dec. 20.-The corner stone of the new Chapel library of McMaster University was laid this afternoon by Mrs. Wm. McMaster, widow of the University's founder. The building cost about \$50,000 of which \$37,000 has already been subscribed. A pleasing feature of the occasion was the presentation of a thousand dollars in gold by the students toward the cost of the new build-

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
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
