CELESTIAL VOTERS.

HOW THEY ELECTED THE WRONG MAN MAYOR OF BALLARAT.

A Political Scheme Which Brought Disaster to Its Perpetrators and Furnished Lots of Fun For the Winner and His Friends.

In the early fifties, when what is now the Australian colony of Victoria was the Mecca for many of the gold hunters of the world, "a tent town" called Ballarat, now a beautiful and thriving city, grew up like a mushroom in the night.

For a year a "law and order corps," a body of men formed for the same purposes and very similar in every way to the old California vigilance committee, had exercised the only authority that the place had ever known.

There were two candidates for the place, Edward Warburton, a Scotch mining engineer, and Evan Tomlinson, called by the irreverent "Smooth Tommy."

Tomlinson had figured out that the vote for mayor would probably be very closely divided between himself and his opponent, and as three-fourths of the Chinese were working on claims owned by himself and his brother he made up his mind that the only way to make his election certain was to get the consent of the "free and independent" to a proposition to allow the Celestials to cast their ballots with the whites.

Warburton and his supporters, realizing that such a concession would mean a crushing defeat, fought hard against the idea, but "Smooth Tommy" had the ear of the members of the law and order corps, who were running the preliminaries, and Warburton's protests were overruled.

Jimmy Barrett, a constabulary speculator, was installed as clerk of election. The ballot boxes were five old fashioned leather portmanteaus, with slits in the sides, and the ballots were small printed slips of this character:

Election day came. The Chinese were well in hand and had been thoroughly drilled into what they had to do. Tomlinson had explained carefully through their interpreters that every man, in order to vote the right way, would have to mark a cross inside the square following the top name on the card.

Each voter was to approach the table on which the portmanteaus sat in full view of the crowd and on being handed his ballot by Barrett was to deposit it after making his cross.

Some of Warburton's long headed friends had found out all about the instructions to the Chinese, and they got at Mr. Barrett and bought that gentleman, body and boots, to help them carry out a little plot that they had devised for the benefit of their candidate. It was very simple. All that the clerk had to do was to hand out a ticket, upside down, to every Chinaman who came along to vote.

It was a slim chance that the conspirators were depending on—simply the belief that the Chinese would carry out their literal instructions and insert their crosses on what they believed was the top square of the card. That the square appeared on the left hand side of the name would probably strike the Chinese voters as being perfectly natural, according to their own method of penmanship.

The Tomlinson adherents, who had watched nearly 800 Chinamen march up to the polls and seemingly carry out their promises, thought that the election was as good as settled, and many of them were making merry over the prospect in the tent saloons along the Ballarat tenderloin long before the polls were closed.

Their joy was short lived. Warburton was elected by a majority of nearly 700 votes—saved by his opponent's own labors. Old miners say that after the result was declared and when Tomlinson found out all about the "double cross," or, rather, the single cross, that had been worked on him he walked up the hill to Chinatown and, standing among the shacks of his almond eyed vassals, read the riot act to them with fiery eloquence.

That was the last that Ballarat or Australia ever heard of the Chinese suffrage proposition.

PORTLAND, Me., Dec 19.—A South Berwick special to the Argus, says the coroner's jury which last spring investigated the murder of Fannie Sprague, and gave up the attempt to fix responsibility for the crime, will resume the inquest next Saturday. County Attorney Matthews says the evidence will be presented the grand jury at the term of the York county superior court that begins in Saco on New Year's day, and he expresses confidence that an indictment will be found against the person under suspicion.

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Depressions of great size and depth are spreading over Great Britain from the westward. Storms are reported on all coasts, numbers and minor wrecks have occurred, and the southwest gale continues with unabated fury on the Irish coast.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—The Times has compiled a statement of the popular vote on the 6th of November, 1900, in all the states in the United States, for presidential electors on the various tickets as officially ascertained. The vote for the elector receiving the highest number of ballots has been used in all states where attainable.
