—The like of the yield of wheat this season has never been known to the farmers of this section of the county. Last week Mr. John P. Bell threshed 190 bushels from 8 bushels sown, nearly 24 to 1, and Mr. R. O'Leary threshed some which was even a greater yield than that, being 33 to 1.
