**PATENT REPORT.**

The report of the United States Commissioner of Patents just printed shows that 38,937 applications for patents, 2,400 applications for designs, 106 applications for reissues, 2,059 applications for registration of trade-marks, 629 applications for registration of labels, and 143 applications for registration of prints were filed in 1899. There were 25,435 patents granted, including designs, 92 patents reissued; 1,649 trade-marks registered, and 511 labels and 100 prints. The number of patents that expired was 18,135. The number of allowed applications awaiting the payment of final fees was 8,037. The number that were forfeited for non-payment of the final fees was 3,997. The total expenditures were \$1,211,783.73. The receipts over expenditures were \$113,673.30. The total balance to the credit of the Patent Office in the Treasury of the United States on January 1, 1900, was \$5,086,649.64. Communication of Messrs. On her inspection she was found first class in every particular."

**A BRIDEGROOM'S SUICIDE.**

HALIFAX, Nov. 14.—A shocking suicide was committed here this morning. The victim of his own rashness is Sergt. Major Edwards, one of the best-known non-commissioned officers in the city. He was battery sergeant major of company 20, Royal Artillery, and was stationed at the citadel barracks. Placing a Lee-Method rifle to his heart, he pulled the trigger, inflicting a wound which resulted in instant death.

Edward suicided at 6.15 o'clock, while less than a mile away pretty Cassie Allan stood ready for the altar at Trinity church, surrounded by friends and ready to marry the dead man. She had been keeping company with Edwards for some time and they were engaged for several months, and the marriage ceremony was to have taken at 6.30 o'clock this morning. Edwards, it seems, was previously married, but his wife became insane and was placed in an asylum at Bermuda, where she is at present. The thought of becoming a bigamist preyed on his mind until he decided to put an end to it all by killing himself.

The news of the tragedy was broken to Miss Allan as she stood at the altar, and a scene followed. The bride fainted and had to be removed to her home, where she is suffering from nervous prostration. Edwards body was taken to the military hospital.

Montreal citizens will erect a monument to Lord Strathcona in recognition of his loyalty in equipping and sending the Strathcona Horse to South Africa at his own expense.

The first regular train from the west over the Great Northern Railway arrived at Quebec last Wednesday night. It was composed of over 40 cars of grain to be shipped by steamship Albanian.

Max Lazar, the diamond smuggler, who made a Montreal bridal couple his innocent accomplices, was sentenced at Buffalo to six months' imprisonment, fined \$500 and loses \$30,000 worth of diamonds.

In the Supreme Court of Canada on conclusion of arguments in the Consumers, Cordage Co., vs. Connolly, judgment was reserved and the court adjourned till 7th December, for the purpose of rendering judgments.

**A BUCTOUCHE SCHOONER RUNS ASHORE.**

NORTH SYDNEY, Nov. 14.—The schooner Gertie Lewis, bound from North Sydney to Buctouche, N. B., in ballast ran ashore at the entrance to Big Bras d'Or at eight o'clock last night. The crew all escaped, but the vessel will likely prove a total loss. She was owned in Buctouche and did not carry any insurance. The night was very dark and the schooner was carried out of her course by the strong current which runs at the entrance to the lake.

The Sydney Record, (Tuesday) says: The schooner was just coming out of the lake. A strong breeze was blowing, a heavy rain falling and the night was very dark. It is supposed that the captain did not make sufficient allowance for the swift currents, which run at the entrance to the lake, and was thus carried out of his course and driven ashore. Whatever the cause his vessel now lies high and dry and will likely prove a fatal loss.
