**VACATION EXCURSIONS.**—The Intercolonial Railway has made arrangements for Christmas and New Years vacation excursion return tickets to teachers and scholars returning to their homes. These tickets will be issued from the 8th to the 31st of December, good to return until January 31st, at first class one way fare between stations on its system, on presentation of Standard Form Railway Certificate.

**THE LATE P. H. LEGERRE, M. P. P.**—The Fredericton Herald, speaking of the death of Mr. P. H. Legere, M. P. P. for Kent, pays this deserved compliment to the deceased:—Mr. Legere represented Kent in the legislature for several years, and was a gentleman very much esteemed by his fellow members. He was a quiet unassuming gentleman, not much given to taking part in the debates of the House, but was ever watchful for the interests of his constituents. He was in the prime of manhood and his death will be sincerely regretted wherever he was known, particularly in Kent where he had a strong hold on the confidence and esteem of the people.

**SALE OF A COAL MINE.**—Mount Carlyle Coal mine was handed to a Moncton gentleman the other day for \$15,000.00. The former proprietor, C. C. Carlyle, retains a royalty of ten per cent. on the output for three years. This is estimated to be worth \$5000.00. The sale of this valuable property should stimulate interest in our mineral resources. A few days after the sale was concluded Mr. Carlyle received from another American Company with headquarters at Providence, R. I., an offer more advantageous than the one he had first accepted. Oil scale taken from the mine had been tested in Boston and found very rich. It is reported that the Mineral Product Co. of New York, a very wealthy corporation, intend erecting a refining furnace for manganese at the mine next summer.

**SWANTON-SUTTON.**—A very pretty wedding occurred at St. Mary's church Thursday evening, when Miss Nellie L. Swanton and George C. Sutton were united in marriage, the ceremony being performed by Rev. Father Bronsahan. The bride was attended by her sister, Miss Margaret Swanton, and Charles Sutton, a brother of the groom, acted as best man. Both the bride and bridesmaid were dressed in blue satin and each carried a large bouquet. At the conclusion of the ceremony the couple were driven to the home of the bride's parents on Main street where a reception was held and a wedding supper served. **DEATH AT MOLUS RIVER.**—The death occurred at Molus River on Dec. 3rd of Mrs. George Stevenson, at the age of 63 years and ten months. Deceased, whose maiden name was Flora McArthur, was born at Port Hill, Lot 12, P. E. I., on May the 4th, 1837, and came to Kent Co. when quite a young girl. She had been blind for the past eighteen years and had been under the care of the late Dr. R. A. D'Olloqui, of Kingston, until his death. She leaves a husband and 6 children—four boys and two girls—to mourn their sad loss of a kind and affectionate wife and mother. She also leaves nine grand children besides a large circle of friends and acquaintances in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and the United States. The funeral which took place on Thursday, the 6th inst., was largely attended, the services being conducted by the Rev. W. M. Townsend, of Bass River. Mr. Daniel Ward conveyed the remains to the cemetery at Bass River where interment was made. The pallbearers were Messrs. Christian Olsen and son, William Sullivan, J. B. Miller, David Walker and James Daigavil.

**WRECK OF THE SCHOONER TARTAR.**—A correspondent from Point du Chene writing to the Moncton Transcript with reference to the schooner Tartar, says:—Schooner "Tartar," Curwin master, from Pugwash, N. S., for Richibucto, with general cargo, consisting of brick, cement, empty pork barrels, furniture, etc., lies stranded on Cape Brule about a mile from here, having been driven there by the gales in a blinding snow storm on the morning of the 6th. It is expected that the vessel will be a total wreck. The crew consisted of six men who suffered from exposure, having to walk the beach for some time or until the storm lightened so that they could see some buildings in the village. The captain was so exhausted that the crew were obliged to carry him to a house in the village which they reached about three o'clock in the afternoon. They found the two light-houses about daylight in the morning, but on entering there was no fuel or stoves for making a fire. Some of the crew are looking after the vessel and cargo

which is said to be owned by one of the Lanigans in Kingston, Kent. The cargo will likely be saved. He was very kind to the poor, a good neighbor, a true friend, a free contributor to his church—the Presbyterian, and one who will long be missed and whose memory will be cherished wherever he was known. For Mrs. Brown in her bereavement there is the deepest sympathy throughout this county.

—Corporal Ralph Markham of the second Canadian contingent now in South Africa, writing to the St. John Sun from Belfast under date of Oct. 28th, says: "I had hoped that I would not have had to write you again from this spot, but we are still here, with every prospect of remaining for some time to come. The regiment was out on a reconnaissance last week, and ran into a lot of Boers. Our losses were two men wounded and six horses killed. I was on an outpost the day they went and so missed the fun. The two wounded are McCarthy of Ontario and Stevenson of Richibucto, N. B. McCarthy was driver on the Colt gun and was hit in the stomach as the gun was going into action. His wound is not considered serious. He rode into camp. Stevenson was injured by his horse being hit and falling on him. He will be out of the hospital in a day or two. [The Stevenson referred to is Pte. H. Irving Stevenson, son of Mr. John Stevenson of this town. He went to South Africa with the second contingent."—Ed. REVIEW.]
