JOHN SHERMAN DEAD.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Hon. John Sherman, who for a period of 40 years occupied a prominent place in the legislative and administrative branches of public affairs in the United States, died here at 6.45 o'clock this morning of brain exhaustion. Death came to the aged sufferer peacefully after almost thirty-six hours of nearly complete unconsciousness. A number of relatives and friends who had assembled in Washington in response to summons, were at the bedside when the end came. Funeral services over the remains will be held in this city and at Mansfield, Ohio. Interment will be in the family plot at that place and will occur in all probability on Thursday.

Secretary Sherman's demise occurred in his handsome home on K street.

John Sherman was born in Lancaster, Ohio, May 10, 1823. In 1844 he was admitted to the bar. He was elected to congress when he took his seat Dec. 3, 1855. He was president of the first Republican convention in Ohio. Mr. Sherman was a United States senator from 1861 to 1877 and again from 1881 to 1897. In 1880 he was a candidate for the presidency, James A. Garfield presenting his name at the national convention. A second time he was a candidate for chief executive, when in 1884 Joseph B. Foraker presented his name. The author of many important laws, he had long been known as an able statesman.

In 1897 President McKinley appointed him secretary of state but soon after taking up the post, ill health compelled him to resign.

Book's Penetrating Plasters.

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THE LYNN MURDER.

LYNN, Mass., Oct. 20.—Great interest is felt in the Bailey tragedy, John C. Best, of Sackville, N. B., being charged with the murder of Geo. E. Bailey. Medical Examiner Pinkham has described the direction of the shots by which Bailey was killed, and is positive that they were fired from a 38 calibre rifle pointed downward, and that Bailey was shot while lying down. Best had been seen shooting at targets with the rifle while Bailey was away from the farm, but was not allowed to use the rifle when Bailey was at home.

He had been seen firing from a barn window that overlooked a plank walk from the house to the barn, and this was the path that Bailey always took on his return from his milk delivering trips. The direction of the fatal bullets would seem to indicate that they could have come from a rifle fired from the barn window. The officers think that Bailey was killed in this manner.

The police have found among other rubbish in the barnyard at the farm a quantity of cinders and fragments of bur-lap, with which the horse blankets were lined.

After Wednesday night, Oct. 10, Best's movements cannot be clearly traced, but he has been seen on many different occasions returning home late at night very much intoxicated.

Whether there were two men in the case the police do not know. That there were stains on Best's clothing is made sure by the statement of Winfield Rowe that Wednesday morning, or perhaps Tuesday, he is not really sure, Best washed out an undergarment, vest and some towels and hung them out on the line to dry.

This is the only time he remembered that Best ever washed any of his clothing. Tuesday morning the horse blankets were burned in front of the barn. These, the police believe, had been wrapped about the body.

The bullets extracted from the body of Bailey have been sent to one Russell, of Boston, an expert in such matters, to be identified with the other bullets found at the farmhouse by the police.

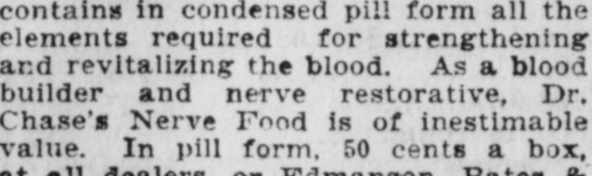
