Keith and on Monday he was taken to his home at Gaspereaux, Queens Co., by Mr. Milledge Van Buskirk, proprietor of the "Eureka." —The Second Quarterly Board of the Methodist church of Richibucto came off successfully last Monday afternoon, showing the receipts of the circuit considerable in advance of last year, and showing much satisfaction in connection with all the work thought out the congregation.

—The Lake Stream, Kent Co., correspondent of the Queens County Gazette says: We are pleased to announce that the mails are now being carried from Harcourt to Lake Stream to connect with the mails from Chipman and Gaspereaux. Councillor L. J. Watken, of Harcourt, we are informed, has the contract.

—The K. N. R. train while on its way to Kent Junction on Tuesday almost ran over a man who was lying on the track about a mile from the Junction. The train was stopped about four feet from the man. He was unconscious when found and was taken to the Junction where restoratives were given him. It was learned afterwards that the man's name was Henry LeBlanc and is believed that he had been drinking and had fallen on the track and was unable to get up again.
