

THE STORM.-The storm which has been raging since Sunday morning, but which has now somewhat abated, was one of the worst, for the time of year, that has been seen in Richibucto for a number of years. The storm did not reach its height until Tuesday afternoon and evening when it began to snow and blow as hard as at any time last winter. Snow fell to a depth of about a foot, had it fallen on the level, but the terrific gale of wind which was blowing made it fly in all direccions. The tide on Monday and Tuesday nights was very high, especially on Tuesday night, when it was higher than at any other time this year. Sleighs and sleds are now in evidence and the sound of the bells make one think that winter is near at hand. No damage of any kind was done in Richibucto, whatever it may have done elsewhere.

DEATH AT ROGERSVILLE.-The death occurred here on the 6th inst., of Mr. Michael Duggan of consumption, after a ling ong illness. The funeral took place on Thursday from his late residence, and was largely attended by friends and relatives. Requiem Mass was celebrated and burial service read by Rev. M. F. Richard. Interment was delayed until the afternoon awaiting the arrival of Mrs. Richard Conroy, of Wine Harbor, Nova Scotia, eister of the deceased. The remains were taken to the cemetery at 2.30 o'clock. The deceased, who was a native of Cape Breton, N. S., was in his 68th year and had been in the railway employ for 21 years. He leaves a widow and seven children. Mr. Duggan was among the earliest settlers in this locality where he was much respected. General sympathy is extended to the bereaved family, who have for the second time during the present year been visited by the grim angel of death.

THE WORLD OVER.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.-Because his sweetheast, whom he had loved for years, bad ceased to care for him. Arthur Rosen. thal, of No. 230 East Forty-third street, swallowed poison Monday night. The doctors say he will die. Rosenthal came here from England two years ago, and made a success as a painter of miniature portraits. On Saturday Rosenthal received a letter from his sweetheart in which she said that she had ceased to care for him. "It is all a sad mistake," she wrote. Rosenthal was miserable. He refused to eat er drink, and Monday night he burned his girl's letters. Fifteen minutes later he was found to be unconscious. He had swallowed corrosive sublimate. He is dead.

LONDON, Nov. 24 .- "A serious divergence has arisen in Pekin," says the Tien . Tsin correspondent of the Daily Mail, wiring Wednesday. "Japan, the United States, Russia and France favor demanding a milder punishment than the execution of Prince Tuan and the others, while Great Britain, Germany, Austria-Hungary and Italy deem anything less than the death penalty useless. An important decision has been arrived at, however, that this divergence is not to interfere with the general peace negotiations. Another remarkable feature of the situation is the sudden volte face of Russia, who now declines either to withdraw her troops from the province of Chi Li or to hand over the railway, as promised." Two nnusnal railroad accidents happened at almost the same spot on the Jersey Central Railroad. As Harry Vail, a black signal repairer, was sitting between the tracks fixing a wire, a fast express dashed by before he could get out of the way. His nose was cut off close to his face by something that must have projected from under one of the cars. Later in the day Charles Toner, 13 years old, who had gone to the spot to see where the hall at St. Nicholas River last Thurs-Vail was hurt, was amusing himself by jumping on and off trains. He tried to jump from a train close to the spot where Vail was burt, and in doing so lost his footing and rolled under the wheels. His left leg was cut off at the knee, his head was cut and his spine injured. It is not expected that he will live .- New York Press.
