DOMINION EXPERIMENTAL FARMS.

"In the Dominion Experimental Farms Canada has, perhaps, one of the most extensive systems of agricultural experiment stations on this continent. We know of no other system under one central management that covers such an extent of territory and such a variety of climatic and soil conditions. The work must needs be of a varied character, demanding wide experience and an intimate knowledge of the agricultural capabilities of the whole Dominion on the part of the various departments of the farm system. That the director and those under him possess these qualifications to a very large degree is shown by the work accomplished and the fund of valuable information that has been forthcoming from this institution during the past decade. But however capable such officers may be, it takes time to get so elaborate a system in good working order and to make it of the highest value to the farmer. For this reason we believe the Experimental Farm system of the Dominion is in a position to-day to render better service to the Canadian farmer than ever before. The work of organization is now complete, the Farms have been brought up to a high state of cultivation, the various departments are well equipped; and profiting by the knowledge obtained and the experience of the past, the future, we think, has in store much better work from the Farms than the past has given us. In making this statement no reflection on the services of the past is intended. These have been many, and, as thousands of

farmers in all parts of the Dominion can testify, have been of very great benefit to the agricultural interests of the country."—Exhibition Number of the Farming World.

ELECTIONS WILL SOON TAKE PLACE.

TARTE SAYS 55 SEATS IN QUEBEC WILL GO LIBERALS.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13.—Tarte speaking at the East end Liberal club said, "I will not be guilty of vulgarity in saying that the elections come like the angel of death. They will come soon because we are ready. I have the ambition to take fifty-five Quebec seats this time." He announced that he would be a member of the new government.

Hon. Mr. Tarte speaking at the the inaugural meeting for the season of the East End Liberals last evening announced definitely that he would be a member of the Liberal government which would go to the country shortly. He announced that the date of the election is very near and asserted that the Liberal party is in a splendid state of preparedness. In Montreal especially was the party strong, having done more for that port than any other previous government in the history of Canada, having been successful in establishing Montreal as a national port. "I remain in the cabinet," said Tarte. Those who asked for my retirement will not have it. As to Hugh John Macdonald he is a gentleman, but he only reached power by exploiting the school question against Greenway. I predict that he will be beaten at Brandon. As to the elections we will carry a majority in Manitoba, the West, the Maritime Provinces and Ontario. But supposing that we divide the English provinces we are even up to Quebec in which I have ambition to take 55 seats this year. I entered the Liberal party loyally at a time when it was not very strong; I am going to fight; be prepared; we will soon have the elections. I will not be guilty of that vulgarity of saying the elections come like the angel of death; but the elections will come soon because we are ready."

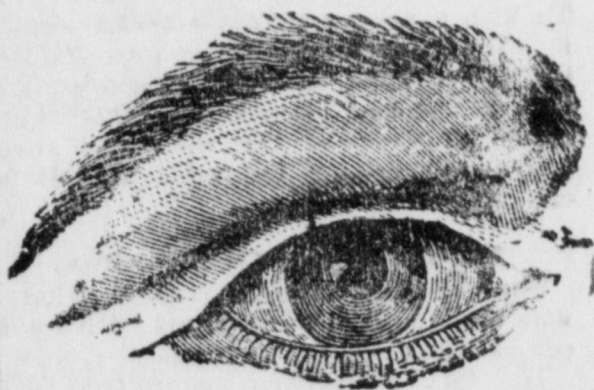
