Liberal Convention holden at Buctouche, Sept. 19, 1900.

Sir.—The committee selected by your convention to submit a name or names to be voted for as a candidate to represent the Liberal party in the County of Kent at the approaching election, beg to report that John C. Brown was appointed chairman and the name of O. J. LeBlanc was the only name before the committee as candidate and upon which name your committee unanimously agreed.

JOHN C. BROWN, Chairman.

Hon. O. J. LeBlanc, upon whom the honor had been bestowed, and as chairman of the convention, then made a few remarks asking the convention if it was satisfied with the report of the committee. There was not a dissenting voice, and therefore he said he would have to accept the nomination. After three rousing cheers for Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. A. G. Blair and Hon. O. J. LeBlanc, the meeting dispersed.

PUBLIC MEETING.

A public meeting was held in the hall in the evening and was attended by one of the largest audiences seen in the hall, including a number of ladies. The meeting opened at 7.30 o'clock and Mr. Jas. Barnes, M. P. P., was appointed chairman. Mr. Barnes took the chair and made a few remarks after which he introduced the first speaker, Hon. O. LeBlanc, the Liberal standard bearer of the County of Kent.

Mr. C. J. MILLIGAN was the next speaker. He said he did not intend to make a great speech but was there as Secretary of the Liberal Association of the Province of New Brunswick, and what he wanted was to give the electors a few points on how to win the election.

Mr. C. W. ROBINSON, M. P., of Westmorland Co., next took the platform, and was listened to for a short time with the greatest interest. Mr. Robinson said he did not want to detain the audience very long, but wished to say a few words with reference to the Liberal party and the Conservative party as well.

Editor of the Moncton Transcript. Mr. Hawke said he had been asked by the Secretary of the Liberal Association to come to Buctouche, any that was why he was there. He undertook to explain why the government should be sustained and said that a rich harvest was in store for the County if the Liberals were returned. Mr. Hawke then made a few remarks on the great work done on the I. C. R. and closed with a few words about our candidate.

The meeting then broke up with singing "God save our Queen" and three cheers for Sir Wilfrid Laurier.
