A LIBERAL VICTORY.

Hon. O. J. LeBlanc elected by 631 of a Majority.

The Dominion elections took place last Wednesday, Nov. 7th, and resulted in a victory for the Liberals. The result of the contest in Kent between Hon. O. J LeBlanc and Geo. V. McInerney was a great surprise to the people of this county as well as outside, although quite a number expected it would turn out in favor of LeBlanc. 'The day was fine and voting began as soon as the polls were open. In Richibucto as well as in other parts of the county money on both sides appeared to be quite plentiful, and those who were mean enough to take it soon found a place to sand it, as the bar rooms were open from early in the morning until 6 o'clock. in the evening. Firewater appeared to be quite plentiful, but notwithstanding this, the day passed off very qutetly. As the time drew near for the polls to close crowds could be seen gathering at the different booths, and when the hour had arrived everybody was eager to get a good position to hear the result. After the figures were announced from the different booths in Richibucto, the crowds retired to the telegraph office to hear the returns from other parts of the county and the Dominion in general, and as they came in from the different parts there was great rejoicing among the Liberals, but the greater number of Conservatives who were present retired to their homes down hearted. A large bon-fire burned on Queen St. in honor of the great victory for Hon. O. J. LeBlanc.

The Sheriff notwithstanding Mr. Mc-Inerney's protest declared the Hon. O. J. LeBlanc elected. Sheriff Leger said he wished to thank each and everyone of mis deputy returning officers and poll clerks, improbable that on some future occasion and everyone connected with the election, for the impartial and efficient manner the nomination paper of some Liberal in which they had conducted the election.

Hon. O. J. LeBlanc then arose and was loudly applauded. He thanked the electors most heartily for the grand majority they had given him. He congratulated the county upon the union and good will that existed between the French and English speaking people. He said the large vote given him in the English parishes was a proof of the good will entertained for himself in those districts. He said he was highly pleased with the result of the elections over the whole Dominionthat the government had enough and to spare of a majority, which assured the county of 5 years of sensible go-ahead administration of its affairs. Since the people of Kent had done him the honor of electing him as their representative in the House of Commons, he would do his best to guard their interests impartially without regard to race or religion. He would endeavour to obtain for the county the public works mentioned in his card.

Here the speaker was interrupted by Mr. McInerney who asked him if he intended having a post office and custom house erested in Richibucto. Mr. Le-Blanc replied that he expected before 12 months should pass that building should be started.

Continuing he said that if after his 5 years of stewardship as their representative the people wished him to again offer as a candidate, he might be able to comply with their wishes. He hoped his large experience in the local legislature would enable him to give a good occount of him-

self at Ottawa. After thanking the sheriff and his deputy returning officers and clerks for the able and impartial manner in which they had conducted the election and expressing his gratitude to the people throughout the different districts of the county for the kindness and hospitality shown him during his canvass, he sat down amid ringing applause.

applauded, for be it remembered that most of the audience consisted of that gentleman's immediate friends and supporters. He said it could not be charged that he had shut his honorable friend out this time as it had been said on Nomination Day. The fact was that he should have spoken longer on Nomination Day than he did. He felt it necessary to render an account of his stewardship for the last four years, but he had touched on some things very lightly.

Excusing himself for not having obtained anything for his constituency, he read documents to show that he had taken some trouble to ask for an appropriation for a public building in the shirtown of Kent,-that he was assisted in his efforts by Senator Wark, and between them they had made out a very good case-on paper-but the low state of the finances during the early years that he had represented the county, prevented him from obtaining anything substantial.

Mr. McInerney than referred to Mr. LeBlanc in the most sarcastic vein and displayed a great deal of unneccessary illtemper. Mr. McInerney evidently has lost sight of the fact that the member elect is the same Oliver J. LeBlanc whose nomination paper he (McInerney) signed in the general election of 1891 when Mr. LeBlanc was the Liberal standard bearer against the late Dr. Leger. There were some people in the audience who remembers how Mr. McInerney and his friends strove to elect Oliver J. on that occasion. Mr. LeBlanc is doubtless as good now as he was in 1891, but then he (LeBlanc) opposed Dr. Edward H. Leger, the Conservative candidate. Now he has opposed and defeated George V. McInerney, that makes the difference.




