SHOT HIM DEAD.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Nov. 11.—An unknown man was shot and instantly killed last night while rifling the money drawer at Mat's Ferry station, of the Norwich & Worcester R. R., which is just across the river from here.

The station master, George Brooks, had locked up the station for the night and was on his way home about ten o'clock when he noticed a pole cat near the road and went into the house of an acquaintance to borrow a gun. After he secured the gun he retraced his steps towards the railroad station in search of the animal, and discovered that the station had been broken into during his absence.

Entering, he found a man standing in front of the open money drawer. "Hold up your hands," shouted the station agent, as he leveled the gun, but the man refused with an emphatic oath and threatened according to the station agent story to shoot. The station agent, then fired the charge entering the breast of the bugular and causing instant death.

A screw-drivers chisel, knife and a cheap gold-filled watch were found in the man's pockets, but there was nothing to establish his identity. He is unknown in this neighborhood, though several citizens say they have seen him about here recently. The body is being kept by the authorities in the railroad station for the present.

On one arm three anchors and a cross are tattooed and there is a fresh scar on the other arm and an old one on one shoulder. The man was apparently 50 years old. It is surmised that he may have been the author of the recent break in Cronton railroad station.

Tortoise Shell.

The finest tortoise shell comes from the Indian archipelago and is shipped from Singapore, and much of it is obtained on the Florida coast of America. There are three rows of plates on the back, called "blades" by the fishermen. In the center row are five plates and in each of the others four plates, the latter containing the best material. Besides these, there are 25 small plates round the edges of the shell, known as "feet" or "noses."

The biggest turtles do not furnish more than 16 pounds of tortoise shell. Formerly the undershell was thrown away, being considered worthless, but at present it is very highly valued for its delicacy of coloring. Nowadays a very beautiful imitation of tortoise shell is made of cows' horns.
