

SACKVILLE MAN'S CASE.

PRELIMINARY HEARING OF JOHN C. BEST COMMENCED.

LYNN, Mass., Nov. 8.-The preliminary hearing in the case of John C. Best. formerly of Sackville, N. B., charged with the murder of George E. Bailey, at Breakheart Hill farm, took place at the Lynn police court Thursday before Judge Berry.

Best appeared unconcerned.

Dr. J. G. Pinkham, the medical examiner, was the first witness, and testified to the condition of the body when found. The head had been cut off at the third or fourth vertebrae, the arms had been cut off just below the shoulders and the legs about five or six inches above the knee. The cutting must have been done by repeated heavy strokes of some heavy cutcing instrument, as the flesh was ragged. The bones of the arms were cut half through with a clean cut and the rest was broken. The other bones were broken and splintered. He also found two bullet wounds at the chest, the bullets having nearly cut off the largest artery of the body. The bullets, in his opinion, were fired before death, owing to the large amount of blood found in the tissues and stomach. He identified the bullets found in the body. Death was pro duced by bullet wounds in the chest, Either one must have been fatal. Stomach was opened and was found to contain ten or twelve ounces of partially digested food. In his opinion, death came about an hour and not over three hours



"The new field is reached by a trail cut out by the original locators, among whom are Jim Cannon and William Lee, better known as "Cariboo Bill."

"On discovery pans from 10 cents to 75 cents have been taken out at rimrock. Sluice boxes have been constructed and at present there is every indication that the new diggings will prove of the finest for hand working. It is expected that much of the gravel will yield from \$7 to \$10 per day per man. Claims, of course, are but 500 feet in length and this has deterred many.

"It is calculated that as the claims are so small and the two producing creeks so long, some ten or twelve miles each, that the camp could really accommodate 3,000 or 4,000 miners. However, sufficient work has not yet been done to proclaim it a camp. On the other hand, it is a good example of the territory we are giving over to British administration under the modus vivendi."

A Puzzling Board Illusion.

Procure a piece of thin board of soft wood, say pine It should be a foot and a half in length and a couple of inches wide. Place it upon an ordinary kitchen table, allowing the end to protrude almost half its length beyond the edge of the table.

Now place a newspaper upon the table, covering the board to the edge, and smooth it out carefully, being sure that the paper is in perfect contact with the board as well as with the table

With no other fastening upon the board than the sheet of paper you may strike the end of the board hard enough to break it or at least to tilt the table.

It will appear impossible. Strike it a smart, sharp blow with the hand or an instrument, and it will either break or remain fast to the table, just as if it had been nailed.


