The wind seized hold of the large carriage factory, run by Mr. Edward Wilson, and turned it right around. It lifted Mr. Keady Lanigan's mill wharf and carried it about forty feet, it also tore part of one of the smokestacks of Jardine's mill off, and last but not least, opened the draw of the new bridge and tore a large stone from the north end corner of the bridge. The storm appeared to be much heavier to the South of here. It was one of the worst seen here for some time.
