WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our regular correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., U. S. A., August 24, 1900.—Despite the indubitable evidence that the Chinese government was privy to the attacks on the ministers, the administration is very reluctant to have war officially declared between the United States and China. If this were done, trade would have to be broken off, the ministers recalled, and all China beaten to its knees before peace could be made again. Further, Congress would have to be called in extra session to declare war, and this the administration is very anxious to avoid for party reasons. Again, any declaration of war would be taken as a proof of the "imperialism" with which the President has already been charged in the platform of his political opponents. Minister Conger, however, is flat footed in his charges against the Imperial government, and the only way to break the force of these and to continue negotiations without humiliation appears to be to allege that Mr. Conger is too much broken by his experience to be a fair judge of the situation. This has been done and General Chaffee has been instructed to investigate and report. When he does so, it will be time enough to call Congress if need be. All that is certain at present, is that United States troops will remain in China for a long time to come and, very possibly, may remain there permanently. For, after the election, there will be nothing to prevent the President from being "compelled" to take a strip of Chinese territory as payment for the expenses of the war.

From recent news received in this country, it appears somewhat doubtful as to whether Sir Thomas Lipton will carry out his formerly declared intention of again challenging for the American Cup. His change of idea is said to be due to the partial failure of the yacht Sybarita, which was an experiment by Watson to see whether he could better his design for the Shamrock. Since the boat has raced without showing herself to be remarkable in point of speed, the chances of another International considered more remote than they were three months ago. Watson has gone to examine the new boat where she is hauled out at one of the southern ports, and in the meantime Sir Thomas's prospects of procuring a design which would have a fair fighting chance of winning the Cup are not rapidly improving. The opinion seems to be that if the Sybarita is the fastest design which Watson can turn out after the developments of the last five years, there will have to be further experiments before any one will receive a contract for a new challenger. It is possible, of course, that Lipton may again race the Shamrock, as he can do after two years from the time of the last race. The skippers of both competing boats in the last race, agree that the challenger could not win because her rigging and spars did not hold the canvas to its proper work—in other words, that the main boom, gaff, topmast and fore-stays were all sagging off to leeward in such a way that the boat could not be made to point up with the Columbia. But that is the whole of the expert indictment, which does not contain a word against the hull itself. With new spars and rigging, the Shamrock would certainly have a better chance than she had last time.

Walter Staunton, of Philadelphia, who has recently returned from a European trip, in speaking of the present political and financial outlook in England said: "There is no disguising the fact—nor, indeed, do the Englishmen make much attempt to—that all England is terribly depressed over the outcome, or, rather, so far, lack of outcome, of the Boer war. They expected to win hands down and are bitterly disappointed because of their failure to do so. To-day, while it looks as though the war was all but over it actually is not. Despite the countless millions spent and the tens of thousands of men poured into South Africa, those puny republics are still maintaining a show of armed resistance. By that show they keep England from withdrawing her troops and using them in other quarters where she so sorely needs them. By the Boer fight the prestige of English arms has received a blow from which it will take a full generation to recover. The thinking Englishmen know, and the iron of the thought has entered their very souls. They peer ahead into the future to see what it means, and what they see there is not reassuring and gives additional cause for despondency. The Empire is unquestionably in a dangerous position, and the English know it. No wonder London is gloomy to-day. Within one—at the outside, two—decades, I look for Canada and Australia to cut loose, while sooner or later, India will realize the great latent strength that is hers, and set up for herself."

Consul General Charles E. Turner writes from Ottawa about the industries of Sault Ste. Marie. He says: "The industries of Sault Ste. Marie are rapidly becoming important. There are on the Canadian side of Sault Ste. Marie the Algoma Commercial Company, the Canadian Steel Company, the Sault Ste. Marie Pulp and Paper Company, and the Lake Superior Power Company. American power companies are supplying power

to numerous companies above mentioned, and are also supplying the city of Sault Ste. Marie with both electric and water power. They have at the present time a capacity for developing 16,800 horsepower by forty-two turbine wheels of 400 horsepower each. The intention is to construct an additional one of much larger capacity in the near future. The pulp company is turning out 150 tons of pulp per day, practically all of which goes to France, Germany, and England. The managers have a large sulphide plant under construction, which will be finished in a very few weeks, and have an output of 75 tons of chemical pulp per day. They also have very large iron works and manufacture a great deal of their machinery, including many electric appliances; and they have made in their own works the iron columns for their new buildings. They have also under way smelting works for the manufacture of pig iron, and, with the addition of the nickel ore received from their own mines at Sudbury, will make "ferro-nickel pig."

AN EVENING WITH DICKENS.

How the Great Author and His People Can Be Studied by Literary Clubs.

"For an evening with Dickens," advises Fannie Mack Lothrop, writing of "Evenings for Literary Clubs" in The Ladies' Home Journal, "one of the items of the programme might be a sketch of his life condensed into about 200 words. The Dickens drawings by Charles Dana Gibson might be cut from The Journal and hung up before the audience and the story of each character and incident illustrated told. The trial from 'Pickwick' could be arranged for individual reading or for a number to take part in it. A bright paper may be written on 'The People of Dickens' World.' In Dickens' works there are 1,550 separate characters, enough to people a whole village."

"Some of Dickens' poems have been set to music—notably 'The Ivy Green'—and would make a pleasant feature. Anecdotes of Dickens might be given by ten or a dozen members, each giving one. These might be interspersed through the programme. A member with any cleverness in photography might make a series of Dickens' lantern slides from pictures in standard editions of the novelist's works and give a magic lantern entertainment. The death of Paul Dombey would make a pathetic reading from 'Dombey and Son.' Mrs. Jarley's waxworks, as described in 'The Old Curiosity Shop,' could be given with some of the members grouped as characters in the famous show and designated, as Little Nell did, with a pointer."
