**AN UNRULY EVIL.**

We affirm of the intoxicating spirit: "It is an unruly evil." It excites an ungovernable feeling and craving in relation to itself. "Wine is a mocker"—it sets people scornful and scoffing. "Strong drink is raging": it sets the human body raging, and raging in such a manner that sometimes the man is robbed of his ordinary humanity. It is an unruly evil; it is the source of an ungovernable, fierce and terrible appetite in man—an appetite which is not natural, and which never could exist if this particular substance were not imbibed.

Of all the passions by which human nature can be afflicted none is more fiery, tyrannical and ungovernable than this of strong drink. Look at the same person under the influence of natural appetite, being content with simply water, or other such beverages, and then see him as he becomes affected by strong drink. Alcohol acts upon the nervous system; it acts upon the blood, it acts upon the finer parts of our animal nature, and by its influence upon these, it acts upon the mental powers and upon the will, and so debases and enslaves, creating that fearful appetite which goes on and on until it arrives at the stage of *delirium tremens*. It is an unruly evil, for let it enter and take possession of a man, and it inflicts him with the fiercest despotism to which he can be subject.

The man who drinks intends to govern himself, but he cannot govern strong drink. He lets it enter into him and he thereby admits an enemy, a most subtle as well as a most powerful one, which while he is boasting of his freedom and mastership, is at that very moment undermining his self-restraint, and all the power that God has given him to guide himself soberly and wisely. Strong drink is so insinuating, it is so seductive, it is so deceptive, that its great power is gained while it is deceiving men into supposing that it is their friend. At first a man has no feeling that he is about to be mastered. He would scorn the idea of becoming a slave to strong drink; but then it persuades him that it is necessary to him, and the more he takes the more he needs, until it seems as if he would have to rend his very being asunder in order to separate himself from this unruly evil. It is useless to preach moderation as a preventive of, or cure for intemperance. Moderation is simply taking this thing in small doses. It means applying the very source of the mischief to human nature, applying it in small quantities; but these soon beget the liking for more. It is a grievous delusion to expect to expel an evil by introducing it into the system, even in the smallest doses, but one that has been proclaimed and practised, and has left the world at the foot of this giant and unruly evil.

Education of itself is not able to cope with this evil. When the alcoholic beverage is indulged in and men acquire a liking for it, when that liking becomes a craving, education will not deliver a man. It will not preserve him from acquiring the craving, nor will it emancipate him when this craving seizes him. The history of the past, in our own country and in other countries, shows that education will not save from the effects of this unruly evil, but that men matchless in intellect and genius, have yielded to the spell of this enchanter, and submitted to the dominant influence of this despot. Education will not restrain or preserve men from the influences of this unruly evil.

Religion has not always guarded men. It will do so if its precepts are allowed to operate. Religion warns men against tampering with danger, and seeks to deliver men from any connection with evil-doing, and when allowed its proper office it will build a wall round the individual so as to keep out this aggressor; but if a man's religion is so imperfect that it will admit the evil and allow a man to tamper with it and take it in "small doses" his religion will not avail. In many cases so

far from religion delivering a man from this unruly evil, this unruly evil has freed him from all the restraints and blessings of religion. The very best man then living became subject to the intoxicating power of strong drink. Noah, a righteous man, who had warned the sinners before the flood, and who for his great fidelity had been saved; it was he, the best man, who lay shameless before his own tent. What this spirit of evil did to Noah it has been doing in later times to men of the highest character, of the greatest virtue, and the most extensive usefulness. It has snatched the Sunday School teacher from his class; it has taken the church official from his position of usefulness; it has taken the minister from his pulpit, and the pastor from his flock. It has destroyed multitudes of noble lives and greatly injured the church and the work of God. Truly it is an unruly evil.

**SOUTH AFRICAN NEWS.**

CAPE TOWN, June 25.—Details of the engagement between Elliott's column and Dewet's force near Reitz, on June 6, show that the British surprised the Boer convoy. The burghers fled, but seeing that the captors were not in strength the force returned and charged with great determination and after desperate fighting recaptured the convoy. Meanwhile Delisle arrived with reinforcements and the fighting renewed. The Boers lay beneath wagons and unflinchingly fired volleys between the wheels while their comrades engaged in spanning the drivers of a portion of the convoy furthest from the British. The latter pushed among the wagons, using the bayonet freely. Delarey was present and personally used his rifle. His right hand neighbor was killed and a comrade on his left was wounded. The affair ended in a series of hand to hand encounters and a fierce melee, the Boers being driven off. One of DeWett's staff officers was wounded and taken prisoner.

CAPE TOWN, June 25.—Jacobus Botha, a member of the Cape Assembly for Alawa North, has been captured by the Boers and publicly sjamboked in addition to having his household burned. The reason assigned is that Botha voted in favor of the treason bill.

**A YUKON SENSATION.**

DAWSON, June 14 VIA SEATTLE, WASH. June 25.—The trail of George O'Brien, charged with the murder of Lynn Wallace Relf and Fred H. Clayton, both of Seattle, and Ole Olson, a Dawson Skagway telegraph lineman, on Christmas Day 1899, on the winter trail near Minto, south of Dawson, is the most absorbing and sensational ever held in the North.

Some idea of the magnitude of the case as prosecuted by the government may be gathered from the fact that the estimated cost of prosecution already is more than \$100,000. Eighty witnesses have been gathered here by the crown from all parts of the Yukon and from the States and Canada. Captain Scarth, of the Northwest mounted police, has had charge of this most extraordinary detective work. Much was done in the dead of the Arctic winter.

Men have trailed the supposed accomplices the full length of the Yukon and up its tributary streams. Some of the special detectives went down the Yukon and out by the way of Nome and Seattle last fall.

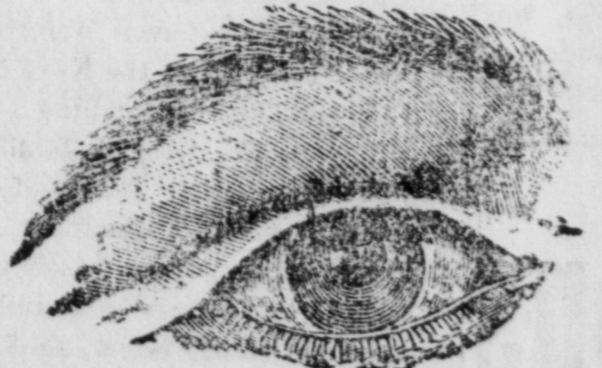

The event was under the auspices of the Ontario Historical Society. This is the first public monument to a woman in Canada, and is the work of the Canadian sculptor, Miss Peel, of London, Ont.
