KENT COUNTY COUNCIL.

(Continued from Page 4.)

AFTERNOON SESSION.

JANUARY 11, 1901.

Coun. Atkinson says that he must call the attention of the Council on a matter concerning the whole County and particularly of the Parish of Carleton. He would like the Council to listen to him as it may come home to them sometime. Ex Collector Jos. McMaster who was dismissed last year, was about 30 or 40 dollars short, which amount he collected and has failed to make returns thereof, to the County Treasurer. The Secretary has kindly spoken to him on the matter and, in fact, he did so himself. It must be a mistake, but the fact is that Mr. McMaster has collected and given receipts for these taxes which have not been paid over to the Treasurer or in any way accounted for. Our collectors or their bondsmen must be in some way responsible. He would ask the Council to assist him in this matter. Perhaps the best way would be to ask our Secretary to write to this man to come and pay over this money before action be taken. He felt in this matter very much, and it is not a matter of unfriendliness; it is just a matter of business for this parish and he did not know the ordinary way of proceeding in a case of this kind.

Coun. Morton says the advice of the Clerk of the Peace would just now benefit this Board.

Mr Hutchinson says the Collector's bondsmen are responsible for his defaults in the fulfillment of his duties. It would be proper for the Secretary to write to McMaster and his bondsmen, as suggested by Mr. Atkinson.

Moved by Coun. Atkinson, seconded by Coun. Daigle and resolved that our Secretary write ex-collector McMaster and his bondsmen to come and refund the money.

Mr. Carter reads a petition from the widow of the late Jos. Martin for a refund of taxes.

Moved by Coun. Peters and seconded by Coun. Beers and resolved that 69 cents be refunded to the said Widow Martin and charged to the parish of Richibucto.

Coun. Beers submits to the council the following report of the Fire Wardens of Richibucto.

The fire engine committee submitted the following report:

The services of the engine have not been required during the last year. The engine was tested once during the summer and found to be in good working order and the committee believe it is in the same condition at present.

The committee request an assessment of \$30.00 for the present year.

Committee: MARTIN FLANAGAN, JAS. FITZPATRICK, FRED FERGUSON.

Coun. Beers also read the report of R. O'Leary, treasurer of the fire committee which shows a balance on hand of \$76 25. These reports are adopted and it is moved by Coun. Beers and seconded by Coun. Peters that the sum of \$30.00 be assessed on the ratepayers of Richibucto for the current year for fire purposes.

Coun. Beers reads the following petition from the fire wardens of Richibucto:

We, the undersigned fire wardens of the Parish of Richibucto humbly petition your Council Board to assess on the Richibucto fire district a certain sum of money as recommended in the usual way and empower us to devote a certain portion of said amount to a fund procuring light for the said district.

In case of fire on a dark night, we have felt the necessity of street lights and propose in this manner to eventually procure the light required.

We are assured by the residents of the neighborhood that they will render us all possible assistance.

We propose petitioning the local legislature for the necessary power (with your assistance) to assess and collect the appropriate amounts. And as in duty we will ever pray.

The Clerk of the Peace advises the Council that the object of petition is illegal, as it is against public policy to appropriate public funds to any other purposes than that for which they were raised.

Moved by Coun. Beers, seconded by Coun. Peters and resolved that the secretary memorialize the Local Government to enact a law empowering the Municipality of Kent to assess the ratepayers in the Richibucto fire district for the purpose of lighting the streets of Richibucto.

Coun. Atkinson makes this remark by the way that this council memorializes in season and out of season the Local Legislature and apparently with very little effect on our Provincial legislators.

Moved by Coun. Coates, seconded by Coun. Clement Cormier and resolved that \$8.74 be paid Marcel J. LeBlanc, road commissioner, district No. 1, St. Mary; also \$6 65 to Alban Dionne, district No. 2, and the sum of \$6 30 to John W. Coates, district No. 3, and that these amounts be charged to the parish of St. Mary.

Coun. Saultier reports on behalf of the committee appointed to attend to the office lately occupied by the late Mr. Sayre and which is the property of the Municipality that the office has been rented by Mr. R. Davis for the yearly rent of \$5 50. The building is in a poor state of repairs and it was impossible to obtain a higher rent. The report is adopted.

The list of the parish officers for St. Louis for the year 1901 is read and adopted.

The list of parish officers for Carleton for 1901 is read and adopted.

Moved by Coun. Beers, seconded by Coun. Peters and resolved that 24.87 be paid to Peter Gallant, district No. 2, parish of Richibucto, and \$5.05 to John H. Robichaud, of district No. 4 and that these amounts be charged to the parish of Richibucto.

Coun. Wathen, seconded by Coun. Peters makes the following motion:

Whereas, by act of the N. B. Legislature, 63 Victoria, Chapter 57, passed 31st March, 1900, the municipality of Kent was authorized and empowered to issue debentures not exceeding \$16,000 redeemable in 25 years from date of issue to be applied in paying off debentures of said municipality falling due in the years 1901 and 1903.

Therefore, resolved that a committee of 3 councillors be appointed for the purpose of issuing such debentures, this year, under and according to the provisions and requirements of said act; such debentures to be in the sum of \$500 each, bearing interest at four per cent per annum payable half yearly, said committee to dispose of said debentures after due advertisement for tenders therefor; that for the purpose of paying interest and maintaining a sinking fund to meet such debentures there be levied and assessed on the parishes of the county of Kent yearly, in like manner and proportion as other county rates are levied and assessed the sum of \$1100.00.

And the Warden, Secretary, Treasurer, and other county and parish officers, be instructed and authorized to perform such duties in connection with said debentures as by the said act they are required and empowered to do.

Coun. Richard thinks the committee ought to redeem debentures with money now in the county chest.

Coun. Landry says it would not be advantageous to his mind for the county to redeem debentures on which they are paying 4 per cent. interest to borrow money from the bank at 6 per cent. Coun. Barriault agrees with Coun. Landry, and suggests that it would be advisable to vote a little sum of money every year, to have in the treasury so as to do away with the necessity of borrowing money.

Coun. McKee says he agrees with Coun. Landry. For the first time since a great number of years that we were able to meet our liabilities at the bank.

Coun. Atkinson expresses the same views as Couns. Landry and McKee.

The motion is carried unanimously. On motion, the following committee for the debentures were appointed: Warden Leger, and Couns. Peters and Richard.

Moved by Coun. Johnson, seconded by Coun. Calixte Cormier, and resolved that the overseers of the poor of St. Paul be paid annually \$1.00 for their services instead of 4 per cent, for the year 1901.
