KENT COUNTY COUNCIL

Continued from Page 6.

On motion the following July committee is appointed: Couns. McKee, Saulnier and Atkinson.

Moved by Coun. Atkinson, seconded by Coun. Daigle and resolved that \$50.00 be assessed on the parish of Carleton for poor purposes.

The list of parish officers for the parish of Harcourt for 1901 is read and adopted.

Moved by Coun. Wathen, seconded and resolved that Thomas Olsen, of Harcourt, be added to the list of lumber surveyors.

Moved by Coun. McKee, seconded by Coun. Richard, and resolved that \$1100.00 be assessed on the county of Kent for county debentures; also that \$4500.00 be assessed for the county contingencies.

The list of parish officers for St. Paul for 1901 is read and approved.

The list of parish officers for Acadieville, for 1901 is read and approved.

Coun. Morton wants information concerning property of Jerome LeBlanc, sold by auction in Acadieville for unpaid taxes. Sheriff Leger states that he advertised the land for sale. There was no bidder, but he had the property bid in for the municipality, which now holds the legal title. A lively discussion ensued, but the conduct of the Sheriff in this matter was approved of by the council.

Coun. S. Barriault says that \$300 worth of hay on this property was sold and that this money would be paid to the treasurer.

Moved by Coun. Peters, seconded by Coun. Landry that the council adjourn until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

MORNING SESSION.

JANUARY 12, 1901.

Minutes of Friday's meeting read and approved.

Coun. McKee submits to the council the report of the wharf committee. Concerning the repairing of the Public wharf at Richibucto, we tried to sell it at public auction, but the price asked was too high, so the committee bid it in themselves. The committee had part of the work done by contract by Messrs. Mundle and Miller and part by days work, under the supervision of Mr. J. Irving. The repairs were made to our satisfaction, and in a good substantial manner. Here is a statement of the expenses:

Paid Messrs. Mundle & Miller.....	\$290.00

Mr. Irving received \$10. for his services which amount is included in the \$276.69. The report is adopted.

Coun. McKee says Mr. Wilmot Brown who has leased the wharf for \$45.00 a year has paid the treasurer \$55.00. On the 1st of June, 1901, he will owe to the Municipality the sum of \$50.00; but he has a claim of \$30.00 against the council. He moves that this claim of \$30.00 be deducted from Mr. Brown's indebtedness for the Municipality. This motion is seconded and carried.

Coun. McKee submits the report of the finance committee, the total amount of the expenses is \$450.93. He states that the committee has considerable trouble with bills from Justice of Peace and Constables. Some people are inclined to make criminal cases in many occasions where this is not necessary.



Moved by Coun. Atkinson, seconded by Coun. Daigle that the report of the finance committee be adopted *en bloc*, without reading it.

Moved an amendment by Coun. Richard seconded by Coun. Moise Barriault that the report of the finance committee be read section by section before it is adopted. Carried.

Coun. Morton, secretary of the finance committee, then reads the report which is adopted, after a short discussion raised by Coun. M. Barriault in the matter of a bill of Philip Woods concerning Mary Barriault.

Coun. Wathen submits the report of the committee appointed to make arrangements with the Royal Bank of Canada, which is adopted.

Moved by Coun. Barriault and resolved, that the treasurer be authorized to open an account with the Royal Bank of Canada, Kingston, in the name of the Municipality of Kent, and to deposit and withdraw money on its behalf, and we hereby authorize the warden and treasurer to borrow from the Bank a sum not exceeding \$4500.00 at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum and to sign a guarantee under the seal of the Municipality for the repayment of the amount borrowed and interest. A copy of this resolution signed by the Warden and secretary accompanied by the guarantee of the Warden and treasurer, both documents under the seal of the Municipality to be lodged with the Bank.

Petition of W. E. Forbes for increase of salary is read and laid on the table.

Moved by Coun. Richard seconded by Coun. Barriault and resolved that \$2.40 be paid Jacques Barriault road commissioner, and charge to the Parish of St. Louis.

On motion of Coun. Beers, Mr. K. O'Leary, overseer of the poor for Richibucto is heard, concerning the case of Luke

Vautour and his wife, paupers who formerly resided and paid taxes in the Parishes of St. Louis, Carleton and Buctouche and now living in Richibucto about two years. Mr. O'Leary expressed the opinion that these parties ought to be maintained by the Parishes, where they had lived most of their lives and paid taxes.

The Clerk of the Peace says that, although it appears to be just that the parishes where these parties have lived and paid taxes, ought to support them, yet the law in this case imposes upon the parish of Richibucto the duty of supporting the paupers in question.

Moved by Coun. M. Barriault seconded by Coun. Bordages that bills for committee fees be placed before the Board instead of being passed before the Finance committee.

The Warden rules that the motion is entirely out of order.

Moved by Coun. Peters seconded by Coun. Beers and resolved that for highway purposes, all that portion of Peters Mill road so called now in highway division No. 3, become part of division No. 2; and also that that part of highway division No. 3, North of the Richibucto River form a new highway division to be known as No. 3.

Moved by Coun. Morton seconded by Coun. Miller and resolved that \$20.22 be paid to William Mundle; also \$2.76 to William Farrer, and \$7.54 to William Marshall, and charged to the Parish of Weldford.

The list of the parish officers Weldford for 1901, is read and adopted.

The list of the parish officers of Wellington for 1901, is read and adopted.

The list of the parish officers of Richibucto for 1901 is read and adopted.

The list of the parish officers of Dundas for 1901 is read and adopted.

The list of the parish officers of St. Mary's for 1901 is read and adopted.

Moved by Coun. McKee seconded by Coun. Richard and resolved that the Warden appoint the standing committees:

Jail committee: Couns. Beers, Saulnier and Coates.
Wharf committee: Couns. Peters, McKee and M. Barriault.

Coun. Wathen says that the jail committee ought to give its careful attention to the jail and court house, which are somewhat in need of repairs. He thought they ought to provide a flag and flag pole.

Coun. Beers says that a sign should be gotten for the Recording Office, as a great number of people from the country do not know where to find the office.

The Sheriff says that a new fence ought to be built around the Court House, as the present one is in a very dilapidated condition.

Moved by Coun. Barriault, seconded by Coun. McKee and resolved, that repairs to be made on the Court House and Jail be left to the discretion of the Jail Committee.

The Sheriff adds that the roof of the of the Court House should be shingled and a new floor placed in the kitchen and dining room.

Moved by Coun. Coates, seconded by Coun. Clement Cormier and resolved, that the sum of \$15.00 now in the treasurers hands be paid as follows: \$8.00 to Marcel J. LeBlanc, district No. 1, St. Mary's; also \$3.00 to Alban Dionne, district No. 2; and \$4.00 to John W. Coates, district No. 3, and that these amounts be charged to the Parish of St. Mary.

At the request of the secretary, and on motion of Couns. Landry and McKee, Ferdinand J. Robidoux was appointed deputy secretary of the Municipality.

Moved by Coun. Wathen seconded by Coun. Saulnier and resolved, that the sum of \$17.73 be paid to ex-Commissioner of Roads, A. Dunn of district No. 1, Harcourt, out of money that may be collected during the summer by the new road commissioner.

Coun. Landry submits to the council the report of the committee appointed to look into the finances of the county as follows:—

On motion of Coun. M. Barriault this report is adopted.

The Warden here states that according to the report of last year's committee the

total debt was then \$11,956.44, so that this years figures indicate a decrease in the county debt of nearly \$600.00.

Moved by Coun. Wathen seconded by Coun. Saulnier that W. D. Carter be re-appointed auditor for the current year at the same salary, \$50.00.

Moved in amendment by Councillor Richard that the auditors salary be reduced \$10.00 and this amount added to the treasurers salary. The amendment is not seconded and the main motion is adopted.

Coun. McKee praises the county officials, and congratulates them on the efficient manner in which they fulfilled their duties. He moves that W. E. Forbes be re-appointed treasurer and that his salary be increased to \$150.00.

Coun. Beers seconds this motion.

Moved in amendment by Coun. M. Barriault and seconded by Coun. Richard that the treasurer, W. E. Forbes, be re-appointed at the same salary as last year i.e. \$120.00. The amendment is lost and the motion is carried.

Coun. McKee moves a vote of thanks to the officials of the Municipality, seconded by Coun. M. Barriault and adopted by a standing vote.

Mr. R. Hutchinson the senior officer replies, and says that this council has distinguished itself by the intelligent manner in which they transacted the business of the county. He hoped to see all the members of this council again next year. And would greatly miss the fine figure of our representative of Carleton.

He praises particularly Coun. McKee the oldest member of the Board and Doc. Landry.

Mr. McInerney the secretary, and other officers also said a few words.

Resolved that the bill of \$14.60 of Coroner I. W. Doherty for inquest held on the body of J. M. O'Brien be paid.

The minutes of to days meeting are read and approved.

A standing vote of thanks is tendered Miss F. A. Jardine, stenographic reporter for THE REVIEW.

Moved by Coun. McKee, seconded by Coun. Richard and resolved, that the Warden leave the chair and that Coun. Beers take his place. A vote of thanks is moved to the Warden by Coun. Wathen, seconded by Coun. Saulnier for the splendid way in which he has occupied the chair. The motion is unanimously carried by a standing vote. The Warden made a very felicitous reply, he had had the honor of being member of this Board for 4 years and had always endeavoured to fulfil the duties of his position to the best of his ability and to the satisfaction of all concerned. He thanks the councillors for the faithful manner in which they performed the work allotted to them, and it being the first of the year, he wishes his colleagues a very Happy and Prosperous New Year.

Moved by Coun. McKee, seconded by Coun. Richard and resolved that the council adjourn *sine die*.
