JANUARY 12, 1901.

Minutes of Friday's meeting read and approved.

Coun. McKee submits to the council the report of the wharf committee. Concerning the repairing of the Public wharf at Richibucto, we tried to sell it at public auction, but the price asked was too high, so the committee bid it in themselves. The committee had part of the work done by contract by Messrs. Mundle and Miller and part by days work, under the supervision of Mr. J. Irving, The repairs were made to our satisfaction, and in a good substantial manner. Here is a statement of the expenses:

Mr. Irving received \$10. for his services which amount is included in the \$276.69. The report is adopted.

Coun. McKee says Mr. Wilmot Brown who has leased the wharf for \$45.00 a year has paid the treasurer \$55.00. On the 1st of June, 1901, he will awe to the Municipality the sum of \$50.00; but he has a claim of \$30.00 against the council.
