





Earth Eaters.

The custom of eating earth is practiced In widely separated regions and is particularly in vogue among negroes and American Indians and has even been observed in Europe. The anthropologist Lasch says that German quarrymen town. spread clay on slices of bread and eat it with evident relish. A certain kind of earth that is found in Persia is considered an epicurean dish, and in the Malay archipelago there is an earth known as "empoh," which is dug by some natives. who sell it to the people as a food. The practice of earth eating has spread to a considerable extent in China, New Caledonia and New Guinea, and Humboldt observed it in various parts of South America.

Some anthropologists tell us that among many savage peoples pregnant women are particularly disposed to the habit of eating earth and clay. 
