A KENT COUNTY BOY.—The following is copied from a London paper: "The secretary of state for India has appointed T. W. Holderness C. S. I. of the Indian civil service, to be secretary in the revenue department of the India office on the retirement of Sir Charles Bernard, K. C. S. I., on March 31, 1901. Mr. Holderness at present is secretary to the government of India in the revenue and agricultural department." Mr. Holderness was born at Kingston, Kent county, N. B., and removed with his parents when quite young to England. After completing his education and passing through Oxford university, he passed the very strict examinations for the India civil service. He has been in the service for many years in India, and as one of the secretaries for the government of India. He is at present in receipt of an income of £3,200 sterling, or about \$16,000 per year. His appointment now permits him to leave India and reside in London. Mr. Holderness was created a companion of the Star of India about a year ago by the late Empress of India. He is a nephew of George McLeod of St. John, and has a brother, George Holderness, a successful banker in Ceara, Brazil.

DEATH OF ROBERT FARRELL.—The death occurred last Wednesday evening about six o'clock of Robert Farrell, one of Richibucto's finest and most respected young men. Deceased had been in poor health for the past three years, having sustained internal injuries by falling from the rigging of the schooner Ella Maud. He, however, went about doing his work until about three months ago, when he was confined to the house under the doctor's care. Consumption at last took hold of him and he succumbed to the fatal disease. He was one of the finest young men of Richibucto and was well liked by all who knew him. He was 29 years of age and was captain of the schooner Ella Maud, which run between here and P. E. Island, for the past three summers. A mother, three sisters and two brothers survive him. He will be much missed by his sorrowing relatives and THE REVIEW joins in sympathizing with them. The funeral, which took place on Friday afternoon at two o'clock from his home on Queen St., was largely attended. Services were conducted at the house and grave by Rev. H. A. Meek assisted by Rev. A. D. McLeod, and at the church by Rev. Mr. Meek. The pallbearers were Hugh McKinnon, Ben. Hains, Jr., Fred Michaud, George McKinnon, Wesley McBeath and E. S. Scott.

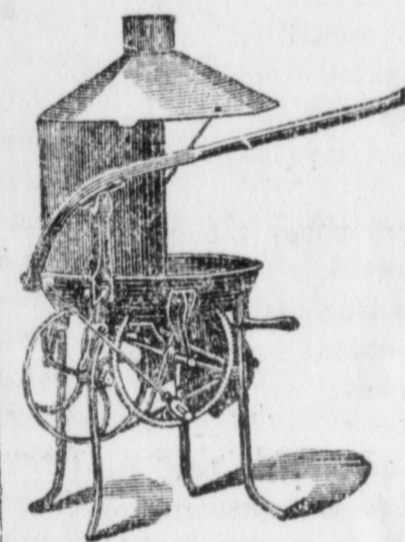

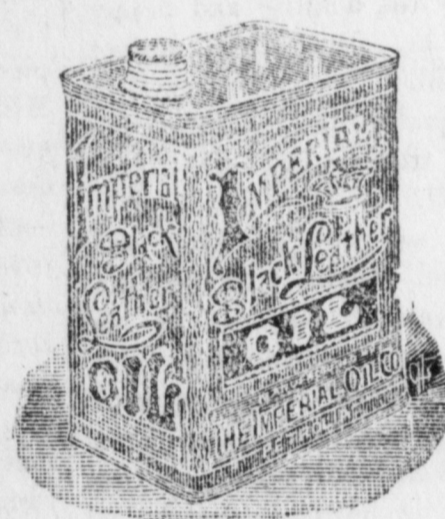
