## MARITIME PROVINCE NOTES.

Petitions for subsidies for a railway from Loggieville to Escuminac are in circulation in Hardwicke. Coun. Lewis and others are moving in the matter.—Chatham World.

A sensation was caused at Truro last week when it was announced that robbers had entered the home of Alexander Dickie and taken clothes from the room in which Mr. Dickie was sleeping, containing \$63 in the pockets. The chief of police was engaged and two "half acre" youths, Ollie Kent, aged 21, and Morris, aged 15, were apprehended. At the trial the boys acknowledged the theft and returned \$61. Kent held the window while Morris crept through the house, making the lift. Morris is a bright lad who says he came from Halifax, where he lived with an aunt on Harris street three months ago. He worked one month with Mr. Dickie and knew the ropes of the house. Kent knew the police court before. He is considered bad company.

A declaration has been filed in the Supreme Court in an action of libel against D. G. Smith, editor of the Chatham Advance, at the suit of Dr. Philip Cox. The libel alleged was the publication of an article charging Dr. Cox with having illegally shot a caribou. Plaintiff claims \$5,000 damages. Currey & Vincent are plaintiffs attorneys.

There will be much regret when it is known that Mr. Henry Whalen is dead. He passed away Wednesday evening at his home, 130 Waterloo street, after an illness of some months, gangrene causing his death. He had suffered a former attack about two years ago and was compelled to keep to the house from the same cause since the early winter. Mr. Whalen was St. John's oldest coachman and through the years in which he followed his occupation in St. John—some 40 years in all—he had by his genial manner and obliging, careful attention, won the good wishes of all who knew him. Previous to establishing himself in coaching here he had been stage owner between St. John and Fredericton. Mr. Whalen is survived by his wife and one sister.—St. John Telegraph.

The death occurred Wednesday morning of Mrs. Forbes, the wife of Hon. J. G. Forbes, judge of the County Court. Mrs. Forbes has been in delicate health for a long time, and her death was not unexpected. She was an American lady and was twice married. Her first husband was Prof. Homer, of Boston. Three children survive, Miss Homer, Miss Jessie Gordon Forbes, and Mr. Homer Forbes. Mrs. Forbes was 63 years of age. She was a very estimable lady and had a wide circle of friends, who will hear of her death with sincere regret.—St. John Globe.

whom he was well known, and whom he had re-appointed for this year's sale of the Albert Thomas fertilizer. In Wolfville he secured \$100 in this way from the agent who endorsed his draft on the firm; at Berwick the operation was repeated, though the Berwick man was luckier than the others, for he found out that Simpson was a fraud, followed him to Bridgetown and secured his money. Mr. F. E. Miller of Upper Granville, was another victim to the extent of \$100, and has been unable to locate his man, who is probably in the states now, as he secured a good deal of American money here. How many more endorsements Mr. Simpson secured to the bogus drafts is not known, but his operations were probably not confined to the three mentioned.—Bridgetown Monitor.

Moncton Transcript: The members of Prince Albert Lodge and Pearl Rebekah and their friends, to the number of about two hundred, met in Oddfellows' Hall Wednesday evening to say farewell to Rev. J. M. Robinson, who leaves next week for Rossland, B. C. Rev. Mr. Fisher read an address to Rev. Mr. Robinson in behalf of Prince Albert Lodge. The address extended the kindest feelings to Mr. Robinson and expressed regret at his departure. The Transcript says: In the departure of Mr. J. M. Robinson from Moncton the city will lose a gentleman, who has not only been a successful pastor in his own church, but a broad-minded public citizen, ever ready to take part in matters in the interests of the public welfare. His popularity extended far beyond his own church and denomination and existed among the citizens generally, who will extend to him and his family the best wishes for their future prosperity in their new home.

The International Line steamer Cumberland has resumed her place on the route between St. John, Eastport, Portland and Boston, and left St. John on Monday morning. The boat has been placed in first class condition since she was laid off.

There was a quiet wedding at the residence of Mr. C. Winter Brown, 61 Queen street, Thursday evening, when Miss Clara Harris, of Wolfville, N. S., a sister of Mrs. Brown, was united in marriage to Capt. Lewis Haliburton, also of Wolfville. They left Friday morning for a honeymoon trip to New York.—St. John Globe.

The St. John Telegraph says: "A small pox suspect was detained at McAdam Thursday so that he could be examined, but he escaped before his case could be investigated. The suspect was a passenger on the C. P. R. train and had a ticket from Moncton to Mattawankeag. He passed through St. John on the afternoon train and got as far as McAdam, when he excited the suspicion of the railway officials because of an eruptive appearance on his face. Dr. Young examined the man but he was not satisfied, so another physician was sent for. In the meantime the man who was permitted to walk about made his escape. The alarm that a man with smallpox was running loose caused a portion of the population to turn out in search, but up to a late hour that night the fugitive had not been located. A feature of the case is that if the man has smallpox and is captured, his captor is also likely to be quarantined with the patient. The suspect is said to be a Frenchman, and it is believed he came from Gotreau Village, where the disease has existed. I. C. R. Station Master Ross last night was notified of the occurrence at McAdam and he informed Dr. J. M. Daniel, Chairman of the board of health, who gave instructions relative to the quarantine of the man on his return."

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 8.—The statement is confirmed that the government, with a view to meeting extraordinary expenses in the army, is considering a proposal made for a loan of three million Turkish pounds, to be guaranteed by the proceeds of six per cent. surtax on taxes of the empire, and two per cent. surtax on inland customs duties. The loan will be issued at eighty with interest at four per cent. and one per cent. sinking fund. The members of the German syndicate which offered the Porte a loan, assert that other capitalists are invited to participate, and consequently it is incorrect to say the loan is conditional upon the Germans getting further orders for arms and ammunition.
