THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

FREDERICTON, March 12.—Special.—The House met at three o'clock. Mr. Copp inquired if the government intended to aid a steamer on the Petitcodiac river, running between Moncton and other points.

Hon. Mr. Dunn presented the petition of the city of St. John, praying that the bill to enable the city to supply water to the inhabitants of Lancaster may pass.

Mr. Shaw introduced a bill to authorize the city of St. John to make additional assessment for the free public library.

Mr. Shaw introduced a bill relating to certain streets in the Northern portion of the city of St. John, and to define their side lines.

Mr. Shaw presented the petition of the St. John board of trade, and also of the city of St. John against bill No. 11, under which persons who have not paid their taxes in the city of St. John may vote at civic elections.

Mr. Russell introduced a bill to incorporate the Greensk Presbyterian church at St. Andrews.

Mr. Copp presented the petition of H. F. Hamilton and J. M. Ross, praying that the bill to amend the act incorporating the Moncton hospital may become law.

Mr. Copp presented the petition of Josiah Wood and others, praying that the act to incorporate the Sackville water and sewerage company may become law.

Mr. Copp presented the petition of the Warden of the Municipality of Westmorland, praying that the bill to legalize the proceedings of the Municipal council of Westmorland may become law.

Mr. Flemming gave notice of an inquiry with reference to the Eel River bridge, which was destroyed by fire a few years ago.

Mr. Flemming gave notice of inquiry in regard to the Hartland bridge and the Upper Carlisle bridge.

In reply to Mr. Hazen, Hon. Mr. Labllois said the amount paid for travelling expenses of chief commissioners of public works during the last fiscal year was \$32 35, made up as follows: Hon. H. R. Emerson, \$208 35; Hon. A. S. White, \$394 00, and Hon. C. H. Labllois, \$35 00.

This amount appears on page 51 of the public work's report, in an item of \$1044 55, under the heading of travelling expenses.

The following items are to be added to make up that amount: J. E. Edwards, \$50 00, for teams used by engineers in examining bridges in the Counties of York, Sunbury and Queens; Blackalls estate, St. John, \$6 20; A. R. Wetmore, \$1 00, and T. B. Winslow, \$35 00.

Mr. Hazen gave notice of inquiry in regard to the Salisbury steel highway bridge, the Three Brooks bridge, the Jones Brook bridge, Wiggins Cove bridge, the McNagara bridge, the Fowler bridge, the Cochran bridge, the Seary bridge, Browns bridge, the Long Creek bridge, the Lowery bridge and Lower Wickham highway wharf.

Leave of absence was granted to Hon. Mr. Tweedie and to Hon. Mr. Pugsley. The house adjourned at 6 o'clock.

CIRCUIT COURT.

The March Circuit Court was opened here Tuesday by Mr. Hutchinson, Clerk, in the absence of Judge Hanington, who was to have taken the Circuit. Owing to the illness of Judge Hanington, Judge McLeod took his place and arrived in time to open court on Wednesday morning.

There were no civil cases. In his remarks to the grand jury the Judge referred in feeling terms to the death of our late Queen. The grand jury passed the following resolution:

We, the Grand Inquest of the County of Kent in general session convened, can not permit the present opportunity to pass over without expressing the deep and heartfelt sorrow we individually and collectively entertain for the death of our beloved Queen.

No language we are capable of employing can adequately express the high esteem in which she was deservedly held, and her memory will be revered through the world not only as a sovereign, but as a true and noble woman in every relation of life.

Her noble heart was at all times open to the appeals of suffering humanity in whatever aspect they were presented, whether national or individual. We also desire to express our hope and conviction that her son, King Edward the VII, who now sways the sceptre of the mightiest empire the world has yet seen, will do no act calculated to tarnish or impair in the slightest degree the magnificent heritage bequeathed to him through his illustrious Mother.
