A TRAGEDY IN NOVA SCOTIA.

HALIFAX, March 11-Wild with excite ment is Shubenacadie and the surronding country this morning over the tragic shooting affair which occured vesterday at Indian Road, five miles from that place Never before has the country been worked up to such a pitch of excitement.

The whole cause of the trouble originated over a load of stone which one of the Lantz boys was remeving from the road. side near Nobles property. Noble protested against the stone being taken and as a result trouble followed. The Lantz boys resented the claims made by Noble, and ever since the trouble has been getting worse until yesterday at noon a climax was reached. As the outcome of the whole affray the life of David Emack hangs in the balance, he having three bullets in his body, while Creighton Lantz and Melrose Ettinger, both lay at their homes suffering from bullet wounds, the former shot through the thigh, and the latter through the shoulder and thigh.
