Hon. Mr. Sifton and party will go, there, however.

Borden, Moncton, are seeking incorporation as The Strathcona Coal Company, Ltd., with a capital of \$120,000, of which \$90,000 shall be ordinary and \$30,000 preference stock. The company is seeking power to carry on a general mining business, to construct and operate telegraph and telephone lines and to buy, sell and deal in farm produce, stock, etc. Moncton will be the headquarters of the company and the principal object of the company is to develop coal areas on the River Hebert.

The piston head of the 500 horse-power engine at the factory of the Dominion Cotton Mills Company, Halifax, blew out Thursday afternoon, wrecking the whole machine shop. A loose strap across the head of the cylinder caused the accident. It will keep the factory idle for four or five weeks, throwing 380 hands out of employment. This will be the first suspension of the factory for seven years, except on one occasion when a strike occurred. No one was hurt.

Thursday was a day of accidents. In the morning a young man named Sharlong had four fingers cut off by a saw in Shives box factory; later near Richard's mill the wheel of a heavy cart passed over a workman considerably injuring him; in the afternoon, Wm. Robinson while working in the hole of the steamer Pynda was struck in the side by a deal and one of his ribs was broken; just about six o'clock Mr. W. W. Doherty was thrown out of a wagon and received a severe shaking up as well as several cuts about the head and face.—Campbellton Events.

The St. John Sun says: "There was a meeting Thursday afternoon of the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company. T. B. Winslow of Fredericton presided, and there were also present Attorney-General Pugsley, James Barnes, M. P. P., R. A. Irving, of Buctouche, Geo. W. Allen, M. P. P., of Fredericton, and A. P. Barnhill. It was decided to call for tenders for the construction of the railway, which will extend from Chipman to Fredericton, a distance of 45 miles. Reports were received as to the coal areas which were most satisfactory."

Samuel Haines, farmer, aged 67, of Bart's Corner, York County, hanged himself in his own barn Thursday. He was temporarily insane.

Moncton Transcript: A despatch received in Moncton Saturday morning

states that the freight shed at Chaudiere Jct. Friday night was completely destroyed by fire and thirty empty box cars consumed. Most of the freight in the shed was saved. The origin of the fire is unknown.

About noon Saturday fire started in one of Sumner Co's sheds at Bathurst village. There was a heavy northwest gale and the fire soon spread; at 2.30 p. m. the fire was nearly under control. Two buildings and a large lot of lumber were destroyed. Adams, Burns & Co., and F. Storey & Co's mills were closed down and the men from these mills rendered valuable aid.

One of the lady passengers who arrived on the steamer Loyalist from London a couple of days ago brought with her a bicycle much the worse of wear. Her destination was Boston, but the bicycle could not cross the line without the usual amount of duty being paid. At this the English woman rebelled and tried there and then to sell the silent steed to some of the bye-standers. She was unsuccessful in affecting a deal, although her figure was quite reasonable, and in a fit of disgust she re-ticketed the wheel and shipped it back to the old country.—St. John Globe.

A sad accident occurred at Why-oomagh, N. S., a few days ago. Frank Matheson, a bookkeeper in J. K. McDonald's store, while going down into the basement of the store missed his footing, and in falling broke his neck. He was picked up a few seconds after the accident occurred and medical assistance at once summoned, but he expired a half hour later. Deceased belonged to West Bay, where he leaves a large family of small children. His wife died last year.

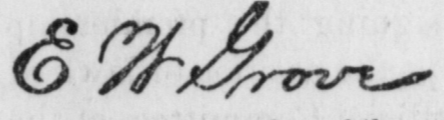

A WEDDING WHICH DID NOT MATERIALIZE. HARTLAND, N. B., June 14.—The people of this place are now talking over the biggest sensation of its kind which has ruffled the serenity of this village for years.

Active preparations have been making for a wedding, to have been celebrated Wednesday and for which 160 invitations had been issued. The contracting parties were Cromwell Trafton, one of the best known lumber operatives in the county, who for years has been in the employ of Ed. McCollum, and Miss Bessie Nevers, 17 years of age—quite the prettiest girl in the village.

The young people had been keeping company for months and as each had many friends their matrimonial union was looked forward to with interest.

At last it was announced for June 12, the invitations were issued, the wedding feast prepared and all other arrangements made, while the contrasting parties were showered with felicitations and gifts from all sides.

At the appointed hour Wednesday the guests were waiting, the bride was ready, the church was decorated but the bridegroom had changed his mind in relation to his approaching nuptials and decided that single blessedness was good enough for him for a while yet. Acting on this decision he had a friend, Daniel Brooks, drive him to Bridgewater on the American side of the line, where he took the train on the Bangor & Aroostook line for Fort Fairfield and there disappeared. It was afterwards given out that his destination is the western states. Whether this is true is not known but at any rate your correspondent is in a position to state that he has not been in Hartland since and that before he departed he made all preparations for a lengthy stay.

Enquiry as to what prompted his peculiar proceeding brought out the fact that Mr. Trafton was not satisfied with everything about the Nevers home. He learned that his bride to be was receiving the ardent attentions of a married man named Birmingham and when it was revealed to him by D. H. ### NEW BRUNSWICK WINS INTER-PROVINCIAL MATCH.

SUSSEX, June 13.—The interprovincial rifle match between the teams from the maritime provinces was held here to-day. The weather was fine and a great deal of interest was taken in the match by the citizens. Luncheon was served on the field and the visitors were all delighted with the beauties of the valley. The following is the score, which shows that New Brunswick captures the cup for this year:

It will be observed that New Brunswick lead at every range, and their total shows that it is the highest total score on record.

Capt. Guy Kinnear made a possible at 97 points. Capt. O. D. Wetmore made 96 points.

New Brunswick, in 1896, won the first match with 701 with the Snider rifle. The record was beaten in 1894 by Nova Scotia when the Martini-Henri was used. Now New Brunswick has the record again. Lee-Enfields were used.
