SAD ACCIDENT AT NOTRE DAME.—A very sad accident occurred at Notre Dame, a station on the Moncton and Buctouche Railway, on Thursday afternoon at five o'clock, the victim being brakeman James Goodwin, a young man 27 years of age who resides at Buctouche. Five cars were on the track and brakeman Goodwin came running over them, when the forward brakeman took out the coupling pin, separating the three cars from the other two. He tried to jump from one car to the other but when he got there they were about six feet apart and he fell on his back on the rails, and the three cars passed over him. His back was broken, one arm almost severed, both legs broken in several places, also a severe bruise on the side of his head, besides bruises all over his body where the brake beams had caught him. Although terribly injured he lived to be brought home to his sorrowing wife and two small children. He lived four hours conscious to the last, and able to talk all the time. His mother came from Chatham and his brother Thomas from Halifax Saturday evening and the funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.

ON TEMPERANCE.—Public Temperance meetings, under the auspices of the W. C. T. U., were held in Richibucto and Kingston last Wednesday and Thursday evenings. The meeting in the Temperance hall, Richibucto, on Wednesday evening, although not very largely attended which was due to the very disagreeable weather, was very much enjoyed by those present. The meeting was addressed by the President of the Moncton W. C. T. U., Mrs. H. Atkinson, and Revs. H. A. Meek and A. D. McLeod. Those who had the pleasure of listening to Mrs. Atkinson will agree with us that if the W. C. T. U. of Richibucto had several members of the stamp of that lady they would do a noble work. Mrs. Atkinson is an able and fluent speaker and was applauded a number of times during her address which was listened to with the greatest attention. Quite a lengthy programme consisting of solos, readings and choruses was carried out during the evening. The meeting in the Public hall, Kingston, on Thursday evening was very largely attended and the best of order prevailed throughout the evening. The speakers of the evening were Mrs. Atkinson, Revs. D. Fraser, and H. A. Meek. Mrs. Atkinson gave quite a lengthy address. At the close of the meeting Rev. A. D. McLeod after a short speech moved a vote of thanks to Mrs. Atkinson which was seconded by Rev. D. Fraser. Mrs. Atkinson thanked the people for their kindness and attention and asked the people of Richibucto and Kingston to assist the members of the W. C. T. U. in the work of temperance. The meeting closed with the singing of "God be with you till we meet again." Collections were taken up at both meetings to defray expenses.
