Bengough, our inimitable Canadian caricaturist, has one cartoon that admirably expresses one phase of the question. Under the cartoon are the words, "Your boy may be next. The monster must be fed."

Do you realize what that means, Christians of Canada? So long as you keep the whiskey-shark, just so long must he be fed. And he lives and grows fat upon the souls of our Canadian boys. Your boy may go next, mother. Your fine lad may go to make the monster's breakfast tomorrow, oh, father, who voted for the license of the traffic because you were short-sighted enough to think that giving a legal license to the devil to send your boy to hell would lighten the taxes of the ratepayers of the country. An expensive economy, truly!

Girls, your brothers are in danger. Do you think you are entirely powerless because you cannot vote? By no means. Use your influence for temperance and prohibition. BOERS AND BRITISH.

LONDON, July 27.—The Daily Mail publishes Lord Kitchener's official report regarding the Viakfontein affair, which is as follows:

"Lieut. W. S. B. Duff has given the following information:
"On the day after the fight at Viakfontein, May 29, Lieut. Hearn told him that while lying on the ground wounded, he saw about twenty yards from him Lieut. Spring and Sergeant Findlay, both slightly wounded. They were binding up each other's wounds, when a young Boer with a pink pugaree around his hat, came up and shot both dead. Lieut. Hearn lay quite still. The Boers, thinking him dead, contented themselves with taking his spurs and leggings. Lieut. Hearn also said that others of our wounded were shot by Boers.
"Lieut. Duff collected the testimony of eight privates and non-commissioned officers, who affirmed that they saw Boers shoot our wounded.
"Several of the men saw a Boer, evidently someone in authority, trying to stop his men from shooting our wounded."

LONDON, July 26.—Instead of coming to London, General Baden-Powell detained at Working to visit Captain Mc Laren, who served with him in India and at Mafeking. He was enthusiastically received.

JAMESTOWN, St. Helena, July 26.—Bad blood among the Boers of St. Helena to wars taking the oath of allegiance to King Edward has led to so much fighting and disorder that it has become necessary to remove those who have taken the oath to a separate enclosure.
There were several severe encounters and the vigilance committee of the irreconcilables subjected those who had taken the oath to indescribable indignities. The ringleaders have been imprisoned in the fortress.

BANGOR, ME., July 30.—For the first time in many years, vessels are leaving the port of Bangor to seek freights in other ports along the coast of Maine, there being no business here for them. All but one of the large spruce mills on the river have been shut down for periods varying from four to seven weeks, owing to scarcity of logs, and there is scarcely a stick of lumber available for shipment. It is doubtful if they would be started today even were there a good supply of logs, in the present condition of the lumber market. It is expected that there will be a revival of the Penobscot lumber trade in the fall.

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Chief Wilkie, of the Secret Service, has received a number of bank notes—twos, ones and fives—printed from the original plates used by the State Bank of New Brunswick, N. J., over fifty years ago.
