

OOM PAUL KRUGER GIVES AN IN. TERVIEWON THE WAR.

LONDON, Feb. 15-The Pall Mall Magazine will publish February 18, an interview with Mr. Kruger, in part, as follows:


"Will no one arbitrate? Will no one give us a chance of defending ourselves? We may have done wrongly. We have our faults and our weaknesses. We declared war, but our hands were forced and we can prove it. Get someone to judge between England and ourselves.

"But the Lord will help us in the end. We shall win. I do not know how or when, but we shall win at last."

Mr. Kruger says the Transvaal offered more reforms in one week than any older country would make in forty years, giving in on all points almost to the uttermost extent, but that the uttermost was seized upon as a stumbling block.

Referring to his reception in Europe, which has bitterly disappointed him, Mr. Kruger says:

"I care nothing for flowers; nothing, nothing! The people who send them mean well and I am grateful; but I care nothing for them What I want is a fair hearing; if they will only give us a fair hearing and justice. I ask for justice. We are a little folk, but we have made great steps."



When asked why he came to Europe, he said to the interviewer:

"I could not go out with the commandoes, as Mr. Styen can; I am too old, but I may be of some use here."

Regarding Mrs. Kruger, he said: "I am sorry for her, too. I have a deep sorrow for her, but I have far more sorrow for my country. My wife has her children. Six are still with her. They were left with her in her home. Two of my sons have died on the battlefield. Two were captured. I believe two more are dead also, as I have not heard from them for two months and I know they were in the thick of the fight.

"Thirty-one sons and grandsons I have in the field yet, but I could not go on commando. I have not heard from my wife for sixteen days, but she has six children with her and she is not to be picied ."


