MONTREAL, Jan. 18.—The Dominion Bridge Co., Lachine, has been awarded the contract for the superstructure of the bridge over the Red river at Winnipeg, for \$60,000. The masonry contract is given to Kelly Bros., Winnipeg, subject to the approval of the plans by the government.

MONTREAL, Jan. 21.—The students of Laval University, the great French Canadian College, met to-day and passed resolutions expressing sorrow at the illness of the Queen and in view of the probability of her death and the mourning into which all her loyal subjects would be cast, postponed their annual dinner, which was to have been held on Wednesday.

MONTREAL, Jan. 21.—On Sunday afternoon a man named William Johnson, his fourteen months' old child and wife were found in a poorly furnished room at 50 Young street, without a spark of fire in the house. The police called the police doctor, but Johnson, who has been ailing for months and unable to work, died before his arrival. All Friday night they had only a bucket of coal given by a poor neighbor, 25 cents worth purchased by the wife on Saturday and none on Sunday.

DIED IN DAWSON.

By a letter received in the city last evening from M. G. B. Henderson, dated at Dawson 24th Dec., it is learned that Christopher J. Weldon died that day of pneumonia at the hospital in that city.

Mr. Weldon left St. John about three years ago and joined Messrs. Clark and Salmon in the Klondike. Martin and his brother Charles W. would look after the funeral obsequies. The late C. J. Weldon was a son of William Weldon, of Dorchester, and was a cousin of the late Charles W. Weldon of St. John. He leaves a wife and family in California.

It appears that Mr. Weldon was at a mining claim a few miles from Dawson when he was taken ill. He was removed to the hospital at Dawson and the attack of pneumonia was so severe that he was unable to speak intelligibly before death came. A clergyman referred to the case from the pulpit mentioning the man's name, Fred Langstroth was in the church and went to the hospital. When M. G. B. Henderson arrived in Dawson he learned the facts from Mr. Langstroth and went to the hospital, but Mr. Weldon was dead before he arrived. Mr. Henderson communicated with Haliberton Weldon, a son of the deceased, who is a lawyer in California. It may be added that Mr. Henderson and the late Mr. Weldon were second cousins. Mrs. Weldon was a Miss Millidge, and also has relatives in this city. Owing to the suddenness of Mr. Weldon's death it is not known what property he left in the Klondike, but he is known to have had one or two claims. He was probably about sixty-five years of age. About ten years ago he came to St. John to look after some property owned by his wife, and was here for half a dozen years or more.

An old lady by the name of Mrs. Gibson, of Springhill, N. S., at one time a domestic in the service of Lord Roberts in London, dropped dead on the street Sunday morning while on her way to church. Heart failure was the cause of death.
