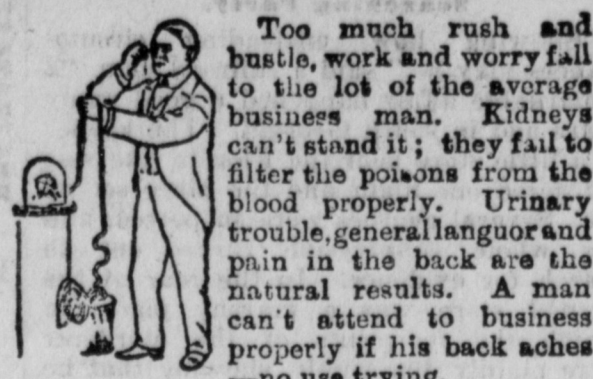

## THE WORLD OVER.

LONDON, March 14.—The departure of the Duke of Cornwall for Australia on Saturday will be converted into an impressive imperial function. The King and Queen will drive in the Victoria in semi-state and the royal yacht will accompany the Ophir part of the way down the Solent. No other important function has been planned for the spring or the summer. The reception delegates will continue and there will be one or two levees and diplomatists and officials. The King will not open the exhibition at Glasgow in May.

LONDON, March 14.—The report has been confirmed that the government has authorized the Chamber of Mines at Johannesburg to start three hundred and fifty stamps.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 14.—General Benjamin Harrison, former president of the United States, died at 4.45 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He was unconscious to the last and a deep breath marked the passing from life of the great statesman. Near relatives and several old and tried friends, were at the bedside when the end came.

After a restless night spent by their patient, the attendant physician early this morning knew the end could not be far off and all bulletins sent out from the sick room were to this effect. The family and friends were thus prepared for the inevitable. The gradual failing of the remarkable strength, shown by the patient throughout his illness became more noticeable in the afternoon and at last the sufferer surrendered to the disease against which he had been bravely battling for so many hours. The last change was noticed by the physician. The family and friends had retired from the sick room to the library below, were quickly summoned.

OMAHA, Neb., March 14.—In support of a motion for a continuance, James Callahan, charged with being one of the kidnapers of Edward A. Cudaby, Jr., yesterday filed an affidavit asking that Pat Crowe be brought into court to testify for the defense when the case is called. He swears that he can prove to Crowe that he was not implicated in the kidnapping.

NEW YORK, March 14.—The post mortem examination on the body of Herbert C. Wadman, who is alleged to have met his death by violence in the Manhattan state hospital, brought out facts that will cause the fullest investigation by the authorities. The coroner's physician found that the fifth, sixth and seventh ribs on the left side had been fractured. The left lung was injured, possibly by perforation by one of the broken ribs, and there were numerous discolorations on his face and body.

be conveyed to the nearest port to the Moroccan capital. The consul general is to demand that the sultan settle the claims of American citizens against his government. The New York will await the return of the consul general. Most of the claims grew out of interference by Moroccan government officials with commercial agents of American business concerns. The amount involved is not large but a principle is at stake.

DETROIT, Mich., March 14.—A special to the Free Press from Grand Rapids says: Raging along the entire coast of Lake Michigan, north of Grand Rapids, and reaching out over the Saginaw valley, was one of the most disastrous storms in years. Railroad reports here show that all lines are blocked, and that not a train on the Grand Rapids and Indiana or the Marquette, nor the Northeast of east of here is able to move.

NEW YORK, March 14.—Three persons were killed and three injured to-day in a fire that drove fifty tenants in panic from the five story tenement house 270 Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, and partly destroyed the building. Farrell Murray was so badly burned while carrying Mrs. Mary Dehrer through smoke and flames from the fourth floor to the roof, that he had to be drugged with morphine before he and Mrs. Dehrer were taken to the hospital.

The dead: Mary Madden, 67 years old, a widow, jumped from fourth floor, skull crushed. George Rantio, 12 years old, jumped from third floor, skull fractured, legs and ribs broken. Mrs. Rantio, 45 years old, burned to death in her room on the third floor. The fire originated in a bake shop on the ground floor of the building. The damage to the building was about \$5,000.

LONDON, March 15.—The Duke and Duchess of Cornwall started this afternoon in the first stage of their tour of the four quarters of the globe. The King and Queen accompanied them to Portsmouth from whence the steamer Ophir sails.

TIENTSIN, March 15.—The British and Russians are disputing over the limits of the railway property in the Russian concession, and guards of the two nations are in close proximity to each other. The British have been strongly reinforced and trouble is imminent unless the Russians retire.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The electric light wires started a fire in Merchant's Hotel here which spread rapidly causing a panic among the guests, several of whom jumped from the windows. One person was killed and four seriously injured. The dead man is L. F. Henry, suffocated. Injured, Stephen Collins, proprietor of the hotel, both legs badly burned; deep burn in neck, burned about the forehead; condition very serious. W. B. Catchings, Kentucky, back sprained; legs and right side bruised by jumping from window. John Scanlan, head cut by jumping from a window; and W. K. Ketchum of Connecticut, badly hurt, caused by falling down stairs.

BOSTON, March 15.—Three lives were lost and nearly a dozen more or less injured as a result of a fierce fire in the press room of the Daily Advertiser and Record office Friday evening. The dead are Jas. Richardson, sr., Judson Craft and Walker Luscomb, proof readers. Among the injured are Harry Holt, compositor, hip broken, badly injured; and D. H. Farwell, compositor, arm severely injured by jumping. How the fire started is unknown, but it was first seen in the press room, and like a flash it spread to the elevator well and darted to the top so rapidly that before the occupants of the two upper floors were aware the building was afire and their rooms were filled with flames and smoke so stifling that it was with difficulty any of them escaped. The three victims were suffocated before they had time to reach the fire escapes.

## TROUBLE IN RUSSIA.

LONDON, March 15.—A despatch received here from Tien Tsin by Reuter's Telegram Company, dated from that place to-day at 3.30 p. m., says:

"The Russians are now entrenching at the disputed territory. A company of the Hong Kong regiment, with fixed bayonets, is in front, while two companies of the Madras Pioneers, under command of Major Johnson, are held in reserve. Both the Russians and the British are awaiting instructions from their governments."

PEKIN, March 15.—The Russians at Tien Tsin took possession of the railway siding and armed sentries are now guarding it. General Barrow, second in command of the British forces, hesitates to act, apparently in the absence of General Gaselee, feeling sure that bloodshed would ensue. He had a long consultation to-day with Sir Ernest Satow, British minister. The Russians are jubilant.

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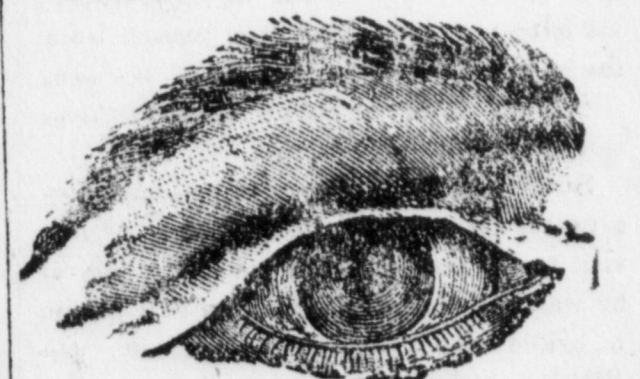
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
