PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

FREDERICTON, April 2, (Special).—In the house this afternoon the amendment to the railway subsidy bill was considered in committee. Hon. Mr. Pugsley explained that it was intended to revive the subsidy for a line of railway from Shediac village to Great Shemogue village; also from Bristol station towards Foreston, not to exceed ten miles; also sixteen miles to the St. Francis branch of the Temiscouata railway. The bill was agreed to.

Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill to enable any town, city, or municipality to grant aid to the Victorian Order of Nurses. Hon. Mr. Dunn introduced a bill to amend the mining act.

Upon motion of Mr. Tweedie it was unanimously resolved that the sessional indemnity be paid to Mr. McLeod who had been prevented through illness from attending the session, and of Mr. Robertson who was in England upon business on a semi-public basis.

Mr. Osman presented a report of the public accounts committee which report was adopted.

A great number of bills agreed to during the last few days were read a third time and passed.

The bill to amend the act to invest the property of the Madras school in the diocese of Fredericton was considered in committee of the whole and was supported by Mr. Copp in his speech of considerable length, the sentiment of the House being against the bill. Progress was reported.

The bill to provide for the establishment of district courts was agreed to, the Hon. attorney general stating that the bill would be printed in the statutes, but that it would be brought into force only upon proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor and would not be proclaimed until after the next session was held, when the bill relating to the Victorian order of nurses and the act amending the general mining act was agreed to. Hon. surveyor general explained that the latter bill provided for a royalty on the coal expected to be raised in Queens county, also in coals of royalty on the shale mine in Albert county, and also enable J. C. Calhoun, who had spent \$30,000 in connecting with the Baltimore Mining Co., to obtain a licence and that property bills to authorize certain of the inhabitants of Richibucto to assess themselves for lighting purposes.

Mr. Mott's bill with reference to rates and taxes was agreed to.

Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill to amend the liquor licence act of 1896. The bill provides that a licence commissioners shall hold office for a definite time, and does away with special beer licence and raises the licence fee for bottlers, who represent foreign breweries to the same price as whole brewers.

Mr. McKeown's bill to allow ratepayers to vote even though their taxes were not paid was considered in committee and debated at considerable length, and upon the suggestion of the Provincial Secretary was withdrawn to be re-introduced next session. House adjourned at 10.45. Prorogation will take place at noon, Wednesday.

Trained Show Dogs.
"Considering the investment, trained dogs are one of the most profitable attractions in the vaudeville line," said an old time showman, here with one of the current theatrical companies. "I suppose there are at least 12 or 15 troupes of them scattered over the country," he continued, "and the good ones easily average a couple of hundred a week and expenses. As there are no salaries to pay for the dogs and no hotel bills for anybody except the proprietor and one keeper the returns are rather handsome. Nowadays they have the business down to such a fine point that the sudden death of any of the animals can be readily remedied by telegraphing to New York, where several men make a specialty of keeping standard trick dogs in stock."

"A dog troupe usually consists of five performers, one of which is a star. The star probably costs \$150 and the others about \$50 apiece. Mongrels of no intrinsic worth are generally selected for training purposes, because they learn as quickly as the thoroughbreds and if anything happens to them the loss is so much lighter. There is a standard series of tricks which they are taught to do, so that one can easily replace another, and a little ingenuity on the part of the showman supplies the variety to the programme."—New Orleans Times-Democrat

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, March 29.—In the house today, Mr. McLaac introduced two bills respecting the Manitoba railway deal. The bills confirm the legislation of the Manitoba government in this connection. Mr. McLaac also introduced a bill respecting the Nova Scotia Central railway.

On behalf of Mr. Murray a bill was introduced for the incorporation of the Interprovincial and James' Bay Railway Company.

Mr. Holmes introduced a bill for the incorporation of the Canadian National Bank.

Mr. Wright, of South Renfrew, introduced a bill to amend the dominion elections act. It provides for a new form of ballot. It proposes that there shall be a separate ballot paper for each candidate, the paper containing a picture of the candidate and his name. When a voter wishes to vote, it is proposed that he shall get a ballot of each candidate, initialled by the returning officer, and mark the one of the candidates that he desires to vote for. He shall then return the ballots to the returning officer who shall deposit in the ballot box the one indicated by the voter and forthwith destroy the others in the presence of the voter.

Replying to a question, the minister of agriculture explained the regulations recently made in regard to tuberculin test of cattle for export into the United States for breeding cattle and dairy cows. He stated that certificates as test would be accepted by United States authorities only when from the permanent officials of the Canadian department of agriculture. A few names had been added to the list of permanent officers in this connection.

The house went into committee on the bill of the minister of agriculture to provide for the marking and inspection of packages of fruit for sale. The bill requires that all closed packages of fruit intended for sale shall be plainly and in-

delibly marked with the name of the packer and his address; with the name of the variety or varieties and with a designation of the grade of the fruit.

The bill designates two grades of apples and pears intended for export: A No. 1 Canadian and "No. 1 Canadian

The use of the provisions of the clause regarding export grades is not compulsory.

The bill provides for punishment by fine of any violation of the act. For the purpose of the act, false representation of the contents of a package shall be deemed to exist when more than 15 per cent. of the fruit is substantially smaller in size than, or inferior in grade, too, or different in variety from the marks on such package or the face or shown surface of such package. It is proposed that the bill shall come into force on July 1, 1901.

In connection with the bill the minister of agriculture said the bill aimed at the improper packing of fruit, especially of apples.

There had been serious complaints about the contents of apple barrels being much inferior to the fruit visible at the end.

The bill was designed to protect the trade and regulations of Canada and the consuming public.

Mr. McCreary took a hand in the discussion, dealing with the bill from a western standpoint, and Mr. Patte, Winnipeg, spoke of the trouble the people of the west have in getting good apples from the east, and asked if the bill would apply to conditions out there.

Mr. Fisher replied that it would apply to all fruits for sale in closed packages.

The Nova Scotia members, led by Mr. Wade, strongly urged that Nova Scotia fruit, being superior to other Canadian fruit, should not use its recognition. There was a long discussion as to the details of the bill, though there was practically unanimity with respect to the necessity of the measure.

The bill was still under consideration when the house adjourned at 6 o'clock. Consideration of it will be resumed on Monday.
