BURGLARS IN BUCTOUCHE.—Burglars visited Buctouche and St. Marys on the night of the 24th and went through the hotels in search of money. The Bay View hotel, run by Mr. A. J. Gorman, at Buctouche, was entered by the thieves getting in through the window leading to the dining room. They then found their way into the barroom and rifled the till of its contents, but only a little change was secured. The robber also helped himself to liquid refreshments. Afterwards the parties visited the hotel run by Max. Cormier, going through the money till. The hotel at St. Marys was also burglarized the same night. Here the burglars were more fortunate in money matters. They found \$10.00 in the till and promptly appropriated it to their own use. Two young fellows, driving a little black horse and covered buggy, who were seen in that vicinity on Friday are suspected. The young men upon whom suspicion rests were dressed in light clothes, one wearing a light hat and the other a dark hat. No one knew where they came from, but their whereabouts are now being enquired into.

VICTORIA MEMORIAL DAY.—Our town schools duly observed Victoria Memorial Day, the teacher of each department had the ready assistance of all the pupils in placing appropriate decoration in each department. Upon the walls were pictures of the late Queen, our present king and many other members of royalty, also of many of her leading generals and statesmen, and pictorial incidents of her reign, flags and banners, arms and accoutrements of war gave force to the cause of the Empire's greatness. Potted flowers banked in moss, cultivated and wild cut flowers, vines, and a lavish use of red, white and blue paper made all the rooms very pretty to the eye. Over thirty of the parents were present at the exercises in the various rooms, about half an hour being devoted to each room. The primary and intermediate departments gave short and interesting programmes of recitations, singing and drills; the advanced department took up the life of the Queen dealing with the history of the Empire during the past sixty years, naming and locating the possessions of the Empire; recitations dealing with the subject, and the chief incidents in Victoria's life; the grammar department dealt with the Victorian era by means of a series of readings by members of that department. The representatives of the school board and of the ministry present gave instructive and interesting addresses. Such observances must needs inculcate a spirit of patriotism in the hearts of the rising generation.

LEGAL.—A very important judgment was given in the Equity Court in St. John last Tuesday in a Kent County Case, The Amherst Boot & Shoe Co. vs. Urban Babineau and Joseph Shebyn. The plaintiffs were judgment creditors. The defendant Shebyn had obtained a security from the defendant Babineau upon part of his property and the writ of the summons was dated within sixty days of the transaction, though not sent to the sheriff for service until after that period had elapsed. The defendant raised the question of the constitutionality of the act, and this, though he did not yet consider perhaps fully settled, his honor declined to discuss as, finding on other grounds that the plaintiff was not entitled to succeed, it became immaterial. It was also contended that no creditor but only the assignee under the assignments and preferences act could take proceedings, as in this case, to set aside a conveyance against which the act was directed. This objection was disposed of in the same manner, the defendants being entitled to succeed on another ground. The evidence disclosed that the defendant Babineau had pressed defendant Babineau for payment in pursuance of a previous agreement by which Babineau undertook to pay \$1,000, or to give security. This, his honor decided, brought the case within what is known as the doctrine of "pressure," and prevented the assignment to Shebyn from being made voluntarily to defeat other creditors. This doctrine has been applied again and again in Ontario, from the courts of which province numerous judgments were cited. Two points remain to be disposed of. One was that the statute made absolutely void all conveyances made within sixty days of

the issue of the writ. The evidence had disclosed that while the writ was dated less than sixty days from the transaction sought to be impeached, yet it had lain in the attorney's office until more than sixty days had elapsed, before it was sent to the sheriff. By analogy to the common law practice, his honor held that the summons was not issued until it, at all events, was intended to be delivered to the sheriff and out of the control of the attorney. Thus the transaction questioned was not within the provision of the act. The Statute of Elizabeth was also relied on by plaintiff, but his honor felt that it had no application to these circumstances. Plaintiffs bill dismissed with costs. McInerney and Robidoux and L. A. Correy, K. C. for plaintiffs; Wm. D. Carter, Geo. W. Allen, K. C., and J. D. Phinney, K. C. for defendants.
